October 18, 1946

Dr. E. B. Evans Principal Prairie View University Prairie View, Texas

Dear Dr. Evans:

I have recently given a scholarship for the children of the Gladewater Colored High School to go to college.

This scholarship is to be given to your university. The scholarship will be for two students to be picked by a committee with the principal of the high school to have the deciding vote.

This scholarship is to be known as the Sultan J. Butler Scholarship.

I will send you a check for \$700.00 in August along with the names of the students who will receive credit for this money.

If this works out well, I am planning on sending two students each year. Two students for 1947, two more for 1948, two more for 1949, and two more for 1950. As you see there will be eight students for 1950 forward as two will graduate in 1950 and two more will be added.

The principal of the high school is Mr. Green and next year we would like to get reports every three months on the progress of the students, and each year they did not maintain the standards set up by the committee would automatically disqualify them for any further education on this scholarship.
