Enrollment of Women Up in Engineering

The enrollment of women into the Prairie View A&M University's Collies of Engineering for the 1978-79 School Year shows an increase of 22 women over 1977-78 School Year. This number also reflects a positive change in the attitude of women toward engineering as a viable career choice.

According to Dean A. E. Greaux. Dean of College of Engineering here, the thrust to increase the number of women being recruited into engineering during the past five years has shown a consistent growth pattern for the College of Engineering. Of significance also, is the reduction of attrition among women in the engineering program here. This has led to an increase in the number of women graduating in Engineering. Last year. Prairie View accounted for 18 young women who graduated in engineering.

Out of 716 students enrolled in the College of Engineering, 160 of these students are women. This represents 22.35% of the total population in Engineering.

These figures demonstrate the success of our recruiting effort in Engineering. It also depicts the acceptance of the program by the total community and the overall success of the program." said Dean

Dean Greaux concluded that these numbers, he is certain represent another national first for engineering at Prairie View A&M University.

New Degree Program Sought for PVA&M

The Texas A&M University System Board of regents last week authorized Texas A&M and Prairie View A&M University to seek approval of the Coordinator Board, Texas College and University System for new degree programs. Texas A&M is requesting new bachelor of science degree programs in mining engineering and political science.

Prairie View will petition for new degree programs in industrial engineering and chemical engineering and a master of science degree in engineering.

In other business the regents awarded contracts totaling more than \$26 million for additional facilities and space for state agencies headquartered at College Station.

The regents also awarded three other contracts for projects at Galvston. Sonora and Stephenville. LEM Construction Co. of Stafford received a \$294,639 contract for a parking lot at the new classroom-laboratory building at Moody College in Galveston. A meeting facility will be added to the Texas A&M Agricultural Research Station at Sonora under a \$164,176 contract with Wilbur L. Brown Contractor of San Angelo. Tarleton State University will gain a new horse management laboratory under a \$94,700 contract awarded to Phillip Hale Construction Co. of Stephenville.



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The Bakke Decison:

Implications for the Black Collegian

With the recent Bakke decision, many aspiring, young black scholars gave a sign of relief. Young blacks were tense because of the possible abolishment of affirmative action, which has served as the vehicle of entry for minorities into the graduate schools of America. The idea that persisted was that if the decision declared affirmative action unconstitutional, the institutions would be closed; or to put it simply, without affirmative actions, blacks could not get into the top graduate schools in the country. But what does this imply? The implication is that the black population is not capable of generating a scholar who can compete with the white scholar and that in order for blacks to enter the universities, a system of duality must

This implication should not be accepted or go unchallenged by the black student today. The idea that blacks cannot meet standards set by leading universities must be attacked with a tenacity never seen before. What is the plan of attack? The answer lies within the black student body. The goal of each student, as well as black colleges, should be

Middle Income Student Assistance Act

On November 1, 1978, President Carter signed the Middle Income Student Assis-tance Act (PL-95-566).

The new legislation will not only increase the average Basic Grant award for eligible students at Prairie View A&M University, but substantially expands the program to include many independent students and families whose incomes are between \$15,000 and \$25,000. This new legislation will make 95% of the students attending Prairie View eligible to receive a Basic Grant for the 1979-80 school year.

This information can be an

important recruitment tool for the securing of students in your respective area. However, students should be aware that Basic Grant funds are available to those who qualify even though the parents income is \$25,000.

A typical family of four with an income of \$25,000, one child is postsecondary education and one parent employed will receive a grant of \$200 for the

1979-80 school year.
Please share this information concerning the Middle Income Student Assistance Act with other personnel in your area. Also, the students currently enrolled in your area should be made aware of the Act and encouraged to apply for the Basic Grant for 1979-80 even though they may have been

denied a grant heretofore.


