

Christmas 1978 gives each of us another opportunity to bring peace to our inner-self, the spirit of brotherhood, and to our friends, joy and happiness.



### **PV Civil Engineers Visit Department of Highways**

Shoyebo On Friday, December 1. 1978, thirty senior students in the Civil Engineering Department at Prairie View A&M's College of Engineering visited District 12 of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation, with the District Headquarters located in Houston, Texas. this group of students were led by Mr. C Luke of the Civil Engineering Department. The Extended Field Laboratory Study Tour, afforded the students to learn about the operation of the State Department of the Highways and the organization and workings of the Department.

On arrival at the Department's Head Office in Houston. we were met and welcomed by Mr. Richard Christie who is the Assistant Public Affairs Officer of the Department's District 12 office and who later introduced us to Mr. Richard J. Kabat, the District Administrative Engi-

In his introduction speech to the students. Mr. Richard J. Kabat explained the Organizations and Working of the Department and delved deeply into the history of the department. "On June 2, 1975, the sixty-fourth legislature of the State of Texas eancted Senate Bills 761 and 762 which called for the merger of the State Highway Department and the Texas Mass Transportation Commission. The Bills were officially signed on June 20, 1975, and the present State Department of Highways and Public Transportation agency was born. The agency is now a multi-modal department with a single mission, to provide the best modes of transportation for the people of Texas" said Mr. Kabat.

The visit to the District 12 Planning Division gave the students great opportunities to advance in classroom lectures on the subject of highway planning. Infact, judging from various critical questions asked by the students in relation to problems that must be solved by the urban transportation specialists. With regards to this problem, the officials of this division feel that the changes in urban mobility that have been brought about in the last 40 years, have, in part, caused the difficultues that face the cities in this modern time and state that until the cities can provide a minimum universal standard of mobility, there will continue to be urban decay, and a continuance of the pathological difficulties which have beset most American Cities especially such that is occurring in the City of Houston. Conversely, while these conditions exist, the officials believe that there cannot be a real solution to the transportation needs of the metropolis.

The District Office in Houston is directly responsible for planning, constructing. contracting, and maintaining all the highways and public transportations systems in the district. These activities are carried on in conjunction with the various divisions at the Austin office acting in consulting and advisory capa-

- · Charge a Long Distance call to a credit card number or student billing number that a person is not authorized to use.
- · Have a Long Distance call billed to the University Centrex System or any telephone number that a person is not authorized to use.
- Accept collect calls on the University Centrex System Telephones.
- Obtain any telecommunications service with intent to defraud.

#### PENALTY:

- Up to 10 years in prison on a felony conviction or 1 year on a misdemeanor conviction.
- A fine of up to \$5,000.
- Restitution for the total cost of the fraud.
- · A permanent criminal record.
