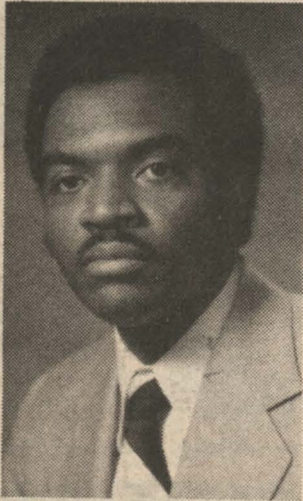
PV-ite Named Manager of Monsanto Chemical Facility

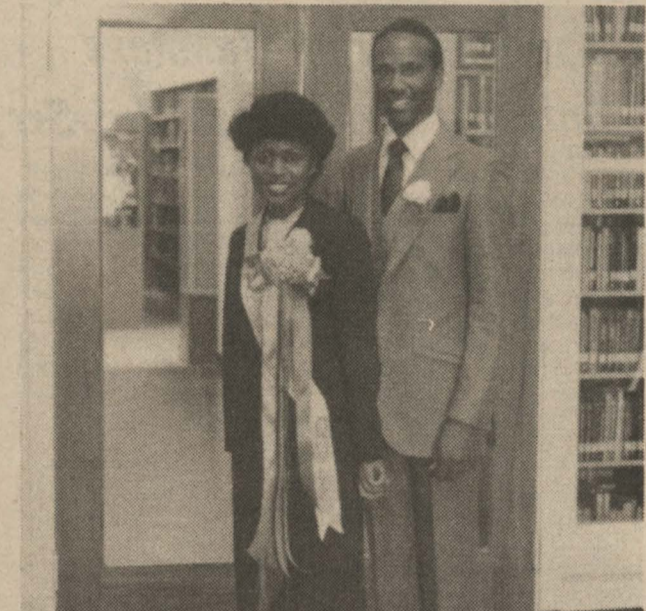

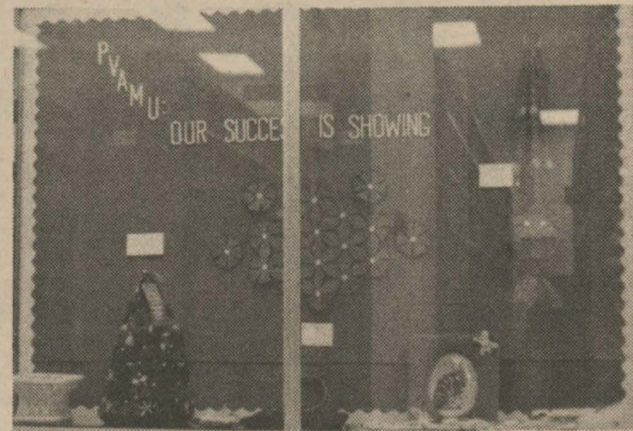

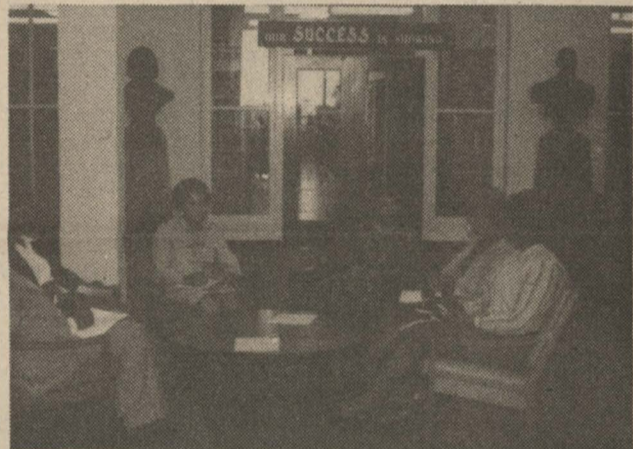

Staff Management Effectiveness Is Goal of Annual Conference

Speaker Discusses Role of Blacks With Future

The historically Black colleges are left over from segregation and are still teaching their graduates to join Black America.

By the year 2000, Spanish speaking people in this country will replace the Black as the leading minority, and "there isn't much room at the bottom."

There is a great need for in-depths studies of Black racism against Blacks, and Black crime against Blacks.

Federal funds in grants and other monies aiding higher educational institutions have been severely cut, and President Reagan tells the academic world to look to the private sector.

Help is there, but of the \$160 billion earned by private enterprise last year, only one percent went to the Black Community.

So says Dr. Claude A. Mayberry, director with the Department of Education, Washington, D. C., who spoke to a packed house of professors at Prairie View

A&M University at their annual Faculty, Staff and Student Renewal Conference last week.

"We are too late with this generation, but not for our children, so we must begin planning a concept, then put it into action," Dr. Mayberry continued. "As in all colleges and universities, the faculty shapes curriculum and recruiting is measured in terms of that faculty and the prestige they create by research and other things of note."

Dr. Mayberry pointed out that a few short year ago, 70 percent of all Black college students were enrolled in Black universities. That ratio has dropped to 25 percent.

"The reason for the drop is simply that Black students are still enrolling in colleges and universities, but they are seeking a white college degree that is more marketable," he added. "To sustain Black colleges, we must have more black students!"

Dr. Mayberry is a graduate of Purdue with a masters in physics, a Ph.D. in mathemat-

ics from Columbia, and has served on faculties at Purdue, University of Pennsylvania, and Colgate. He has had two books published, and 20 articles in various publications.

The five-day conference, which closed Friday, is Prairie View A&M University's way of looking at itself, considering every phase of higher education, present and future.

The theme this year was "Strengthening and Enhancing Institutional Quality through Faculty and Staff Management Effectiveness."

The Purpose of the All-Faiths Chapel

In the spring 1981 issue of the Journal of Ministries to Blacks in High Education, Dr. Lawrence Edward Carter published an article on the purpose of the chapel on a college campus. As we look to the day that Prairie View will have its All-faith Chapel. I thought it would be appropriate for us to think on some of the things Dr. Carter says about the chapel.

The chapel speaks to the college; it does not speak for the college.

Because colleges shape the value commitments of students, citizens and community leaders, they have an ideological responsibility.

The ministry of the chapel concerns itself with the intellectual life of the college, because that is the college's chief business. The chapel continually asks the university center what it means by being a university; what values does it hold which make it cohere and hang together? The chapel calls attention to the common root of the words "university" and "universe;" and suggests that whatever it is that gives unity to the universe may be the final unity of the university. This constitutes a religious question, and no self-conscious college that reflects seriously on its own purpose can avoid this ultimate query.

The chapel reminds the college that truth is found in many forms: in behavior, in books, in experiments, in people, and in propositions that can be verified, not short of ultimate ideals. The college is thereby called to an appropriate humility. Humility results when the love of God is institutionalized in a "learning society." Such academics are likely to be more humble than a mere "learned society." We

must all aspire to be students of the ultimate teacher.

The chapel also reminds the college that it is engaged in a fundamental work, the work of thinking. In a time when the academic community is torn by contradictory demands, confusion about its identity, alternate lifestyles among its faculty and students, and electronic and human idolatries, it behooves the chapel to remind the college that thinking is an absolutely indispensable element. Moral thinking is a means by which intelligent men praise God, love their neighbors, and administer justice. The neighbor is loved when his rights are protected, his diseases healed, when a wise teacher stirs his mind and opens to him the wonders of everything true. Thinking is the work committed to the college and the chapel. Scripture tells us that we should "love the Lord our God with all thy heart, soul, mind, and strength."

The Chapel is ecumenical; but its witness is not a fragmented Christianity. Neither is it the "blind leading the blind!" It is rooted in Jesus Christ. It is interdenominational, interracial, and international. The focus is on spiritual unity and not on religious uniformity.

It is a further mission of the chapel to the college to do considerable counseling, person-to-person and person-to-group, responding to the multitude of human needs. It's people seek out faculty and students to raise with them significant issues of modern life. Whether "new men" See KOLLAR KORNER, Page 6

come before, during, after, or with a new society is unknown; but it appears certain that evil men can corrupt any good system, and that no society can be renewed by unregenerate people. Therefore, the chapel ministry includes efforts to bring people to decisions about their own character standards, worth, finitude, alienation, and guilt. A person's moral and spiritual struggle for meaningful identity in an age of anxiety stemming from our entrance into the age of nuclear omnipotence is where the chaplain focuses as counselor.
