B. ENROLLMENT -

The enrollment at Prairie View, as revealed by the Registrar's Office, has hit an all time high of 2,100 students. If the Institution had sufficient housing, this enrollment would easily exceed the 3,000 mark. It was indeed painful to deny nearly 1,000 students the coveted privilege of enrolling here this session. By the First of September more than 1,900 students had sent, in advance, the initial payment of \$49.80.

C. MISS MARY ERNESTINE SUAREZ -

For twenty years she served the Institution faithfully and efficiently in every assignment, and at no time did she ever "grow weary in well doing." It is made possible by contributions of interested friends, occassionally the Faculty Community Chest, but mainly the ladies put on various devices of fund raising. We want to commend this worthy movement and beg of you, your sympathetic interest and support. Below we are giving an exerpt from the Annual Report of the Organization which covers its purpose:

"The Vomen's Welfare Organization on Prairie Viou's campus serves as a medium through which those who are interested in rendering unselfish service to those who are less fortunate might do so.

Our territory covers Hempstead, Waller, and Prairie View Community. We give emergency aid to those in need until we are able to secure state aid for those who are eligible for it. Medical aid has been given to children with deformed bodies, poor vision, defective teeth, as well as food and clothing have been supplied.

This aid is secured through co-operative efforts by the members of the organization, donations from other clubs and organizations on the campus and individual aid which might be money, food or clothing. We assure you that we are grateful for help in any form. The following is a partial financial report of the organization:

Balance on Hand: 142.90
