#### B. VOCATIONAL TONFERENCE -

This was, without a doubt, a most significant gathering of Vocational teachers and the discussions were most helpful to those who were seeking greater understanding about their particular problems. There have been many requests for another Conference as early as the time will permit. Professor T. L. Holley deserves commendation for the very constructive way he directed the discussions.

#### C. HOUSING CONFERENCE -

The Second Housing Conference was held at Prairie View April 25 and 26. The attendance was large; the discussions were stimulating and informative; and, the outcome of the Conference was helpful. Some of the prominent speakers who participated were Mr. Walter (Chief) Aiken, Atlanta, Georgia, Mr. E. W. Morrison of Detroit, Mr. S. J. Danley of Washington, D. C., Mr. A. # D. IN SERVICE TRAINING COURSE -

The Texas State Board of Health sponsored the Second In-service Workshop for graduate nurses at Prairie View A. and M. College, April 4-6. There were, in attendance, thirty-six nurses and ten lecturers. This group of nurses came from a wide area of Texas which means that the training and inspiration received will touch most of our State.
