

B. FACULTY ORIENTATION -

The period of September 7-10, 1949 was appropriately utilized by the Faculty in the Eleventh Annual Orientation Conference, using as the theme: "Teacher Education at Prairie View A & M College -- Its Significance and Its Challenges." The Conference was highlighted with a very able and practical address by Dr. Hob Gray of the University of Texas, Austin. The Conference was conducted on the Panel Discussion and Workshop Plan. It was brought to a close with divisional staff conferences and a picnic in the Grove.

C. ENROLLMENT -

As predicted, the enrollment has far exceeded previous years, with several hundred students having been denied admission because of the lack of rooms in the dormitories. Registration has already passed the 2,000 mark. Under very crowded conditions, the enrollment this year will reach the all-time high of 2,200 students.

D. PHYSICAL EXAMINATIONS -

Every student enrolled was given a thorough physical examination, which included a blood test. This complete service was made possible by the Texas State Health Department, which sent a complete unit here for four days' use.

E. CLASS WORK -

Class work in all divisions of the College will begin September 19, with an able faculty, trained in some of the best institutions in America. Laboratories, classroom ecuipmen' and library facilities have been strengthened, and there is every prospect of a fine year of ratisfactory academic performance.
