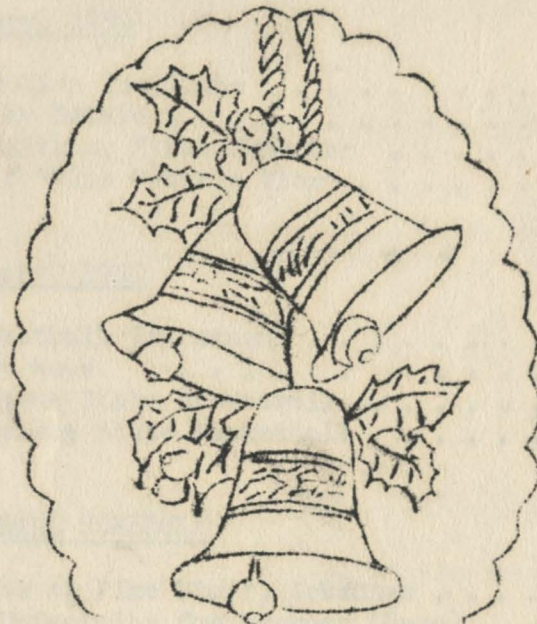

L. COMMUNITY CHEST


Attention is called again to the Community Chest obligations. Mr. W. R. Banks reports that the payments have been coming in nicely. Help us close out this matter at once, please.
