## **Solar Heating Approved By Waller Commissioners**

Waller County Commissioners Court has approved a solar heating project designed by engineers at Prairie View A&M University, and will seek federal funds recently provided

for such energy programs. John R. Williams, head of the University's Center for Energy Affairs, said the system, to be used primarily to heat asphalt, will cost an estimated \$15,000 and should save the county 75% in heating

"This project will give the citizens of Waller County a chance to see how solar energy is an alternative and the costs are not prohibitive;' Williams

Jack Rafferty, county road commissioner, lauded the project and efforts by Prairie View A&M.

'We went to Dr. Thomas (Alvin I. Thomas, university president; and asked for their help and they sure did come through;' Rafferty said. "We now heat by electricity and it costs about \$600 to keep asphalt hot, and it must stay He explained that the county

buys asphalt, used year round for patching purposes on roads, in 6,000 pound loads and stores it in a 10,000 gallon refurbished railroad tank car. 'That's the least we can buy

at a time, and we must keep it at between 165 to 170 degrees at all times or we lose it," Rafferty explained. "That's a lot of constant heat."



Students are eligible who have completed at least two years of college and who have demonstrated a long-time interest in the news and editorial phase of newspapering





#### Special Tax Advice For Senior Citizens

Some senior citizens find they have the time to travel; others enjoy meeting new friends or taking up new hobbies; then there are still others on the workforce. If you are age 65 or older, no matter what you do, you should be aware of certain tax benefits that apply to senior

For instance, anyone 65 or older is entitled to an extra exemption of \$1,000, up from last year's \$750. That means an automatic reduction to income of \$2,000 for single persons, and \$4,000 for a married couple, both 65 or older, who file a joint return.

The release of test questions and answer sheets meets the requirements of the New York State Admissions Testing Law of 1979, which went into effect January 1.

FUEL-EFFICIENT CARS TO BRING BONUS

A bill introduced in the state Senate could give Californians who buy fuel-efficient new cars a \$400 tax break. Sales tax exemptions under the proposal, authored by Alan Sieroty (D-West Los Angeles), would apply to 1981 American-made cars that get 25 to 30 miles per gallon in city traffic. Sieroty said his bill was a logical extension of tax incentives already granted to people who install solar energy-saving

"The curtailed schedule in New York State will provide the GRE program with time to increase test development and address other technical concerns generated by the new law," Sussman said.


