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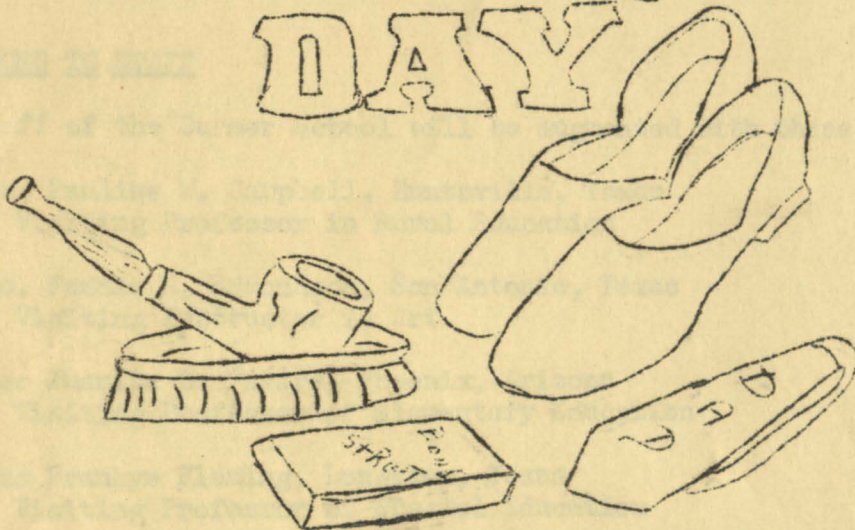

A. SUMMER SCHOOL

On June 4, 1951 the next regular Summer Session will begin with an enrollment of nearly 2,000 men and women. Most of these enrollees will be prominent principals of high schools and public school teachers from both rural and urban areas of Arkansas, Louisiana, Oklahoma and Texas. The Registrar's Office has released the information that more than 1,000 students of the Summer School will be doing work on the Master's Degree level.

C. COOPERATIVE COMMUNITY EDUCATION WORKSHOP

The first term of the Summer Session, the Cooperative Community Education Workshop will be conducted under the sponsorship of Wiley, Bishop, Texas, Tillotson and Samuel Huston Colleges; Texas Southern University, the Hogg Foundation and Texas Tuberculosis Association and Prairie View A & M College.

Dr. J. L. Brown of Prairie View A. and M. College will coordinate the activities of this project. The colleges will work in areas as follows:

1. Prairie View A & M College - Problems of Elementary Education
2. Tillotson College - Problems of Health and Family Welfare
3. Texas College - Problems of School Supervision
4. Wiley College - Problems of Public School Administration
5. Samuel Huston College - Problems of Guidance and Counseling
6. Bishop College - Problems of Methods of Supervision
7. Texas Southern University - Problems in Curriculum Construction

D. AREAS OF SPECIAL EDUCATION

In addition to the Cooperative Community Education Workshop, there will be other special workshops in areas of:

1. Principals of Elementary Schools will have a Workshop in the Role of the Elementary School Principal in the immediate charge of Mr. John W. Howell, Topeka, Kansas.
2. Library Service Workshop is designed to help those who are employed as Librarians in the Public Schools, without formal training in the techniques of Library Services. Miss Mildred Montgomery will be in charge.
3. Hot Lunch Workshop is to serve those who have the Hot Lunch Program in their schools. All problems incident to the operation of an effective Hot Lunch Program will be explored.
4. Extension Agents Regional Training Program will run the first four weeks of the Summer School. There will be enrolled upward of 100 Agriculture Extension Agents from ten southern states. Able men will give instructions. These include:

 6. Dr. J. L. Matthews, Educational Research, Washington, D. C.

State Extension Agents, under the leadership of Mr. T. M. Campbell, Tuskegee Institute, will have a six-days' conference on Problems of Special Significance to State Directors of Negro Extension Service.

Exercises commemorating our 75th Anniversary Year were very successfully conducted on May 19, and also in connection with Commencement on May 20.


