The English Institute is an annual workshop of the Prairie View's Department of English to bring authorities in the field before students who plan to teach in the fields of English-Language Arts and also before teachers in these areas.

Panther Cagers Down Grambling, Alcorn, TSU

The Prairie View A&M College Panthers played the role of spoilers in the tight Southwestern Conference basketball race over the past week.

The Freshmen studded Panther five, coached by veteran mentor Leroy Moore, dropped Texas Southern from a 3-1 league tie with Alcorn A&M, winning two in a row. Prairie View whipped the TSU Tigers 78-60 in the "little dome," which was considered a possibility, but the 91-88 licking at Texas Southern was a real surprise.

Then came the league leading Grambling College, who fell before the Panther 86-82. Grambling's Tigers and Alcorn were leading, and following Grambling demise, the Panthers continued in the spoiler role, downing the last big leader Alcorn 80-76.

In mid-February games on the road, the Panthers dropped by very narrow margins their encounters with Jackson and Southern. They returned to down Wiley 97-80, but lost to Arkansas AM&N in the final conference tilt of the season.

Arkansas, Alcorn and Grambling finished in a first place tie. Prairie View closed conference competition with a 6-8 league record and a 12-12 record for the season.
