D. COOPERATIVE COMMUNITY EDUCATION WORKSHOP

This cooperative project is designed for principals, supervisors, teachers and nurses who wish to improve their personal resources for services to the school and community and meet requirements established in the Gilmer-Aiken program. The purpose of the workshop is to help in-service personnel enrich their understandings, skills and techniques in promoting, organizing, executing, coordinating and correlating classroom, school and community activities; to increase cooperation with allied agencies; and to extend and project the curriculum of the school into the total community.

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Dr. J. L. Brown, Director of Extramural Services will coordinate the activities of the project which will be conducted on the campus of Wiley College.

E. AREAS OF SPECIAL EDUCATION

A number of workshops and special activities will be conducted on our campus and they will include:

1. Elementary Education - Mr. John L. Howell, Chief Consultant

- 2. <u>Library Service Workshop</u> designed to help those employed as librarians in the public schools who do not have specialized training in library service. Miss E. P. McAden, Chief Consultant.
- 3. Hot Lunch Workshop designed to help those who are working with school lunch programs in their own communities.
- .4. Regional School for Extension Workers will run for the first three weeks of the summer term. There will be enrolled upward of 100 agricultural extension agents from the southern states. An able faculty will include:

- 5. Supervisors Workshop A cooperative venture sponsored by the college with the Texas Education Agency, the Southern Education Foundation, and two other colleges: Bishop and Texas Southern. Chief Consultant will be Miss Jimmie T. Brashear, Consultant in Elementary Schools, Dallas Public Schools.
- 6. Principals As Consultants In addition to the regular summer school and workshop activities, the college will have as guest consultants several outstanding public school administrators who will serve as consultants in activities dealing with problems of administration and supervision.
- 7. Civil Defense Workshop Prairie View has recognized the need for a program of education for national security and will cooperate with the State Civil Defense School Advisory Council in conducting a one-day workshop on June 24.
