### B. SUMMER SCHOOL

The enrollment for the Second Term of the Summer School has exceeded that of previous years. Three hundred seventy-seven of the 2400 teachers, administrators and other personnel in elementary and secondary schools and colleges throughout the State, in attendance at the Prairie View A & M College during the 1952 summer session, have applied for graduation, according to figures released by Dr. T. R. Solomon, Registrar. Two hundred eighteen of the applications for graduation were for the master's degree.

# C. VOCATIONAL AGRICULTURE TEACHERS' WORKSHOP

Sponsored by the Texas Education Agency, a three-week short course for local vocational agriculture teachers is being held at Prairie View. The purpose of the short course is to offer leadership training for committee chairmen who will participate in the State Conference for Vocational Agriculture teachers, which will be held at Prairie View August 24-27. Those in attendance will receive graduate credit for the three-week course. Approximately eighteen vocational agriculture leaders are expected to attend the short course.

### D. SUPERVISORS' WOFKSHOP

Leaders in school administration and in supervision from all over the State are in attendance in the three-week workshop for supervisors to confer and discuss current problems and trends in their field. Dr. John E. Codwell, Principal, Wheatley High School, Houston; Dr. Robert R. Ewerz, Chief Consultant, Supervisor's Workshop, University of Houston; Mrs. Theresa Carroll, Supervisor of Supervision, Texas Education Agency, and others serve as resource leaders.

#### E. COMMENCEMENT

The climax of the summer school will be the Commencement exercises which will be observed on August 20. Dr. C. V. Troup, President of the Fort Valley State College, Georgia, will be the Commencement speaker.
