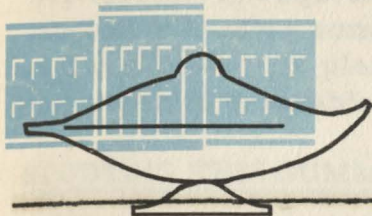


CONCERNING THE LIBRARY
