## Run-off elections will be held next Tuesday; duel between Olusanyo and Reggans

In the SGA elections held yesterday, more than 1,000 students came out to support their favorite candidates and vote for the 2005-06 president, vice president, comptroller and Mr. PV. Students where able to readily access their voting privileges till 5 p.m.

All students were eli-

gible to vote, with the ease of electronic voting on laptops provided by the John B. Coleman library. "I voted for a particular candidate because I wanted to see the person who was not just good for me, but has the student body's best interest in mind in office," said senior music major Kasai Porter.

SGA will hold a run off election between Oludayo Olusanyo who pulled in 482 (42.92%) of the presidential

votes, and LaShawn Chambers-Reggans who had 244 (21.73%) votes. Bryan Waters and Terrance Livingston earned 200(17.81%) and 197 (17.55%) votes respec-

Candidates must have a 51% margin or higher to be declared the official winner in an election. Students will have the opportunity to vote again in the



Proud parents, prestigious alumni, faculty, and friends gathered to recognize outstanding undergraduate students during the annual Founders' Day and Honors Convocation. The esteemed event took place Wednesday, March 30, from 10 a.m. to noon at the William J. Nicks building.

This year's convocation was hosted by the College of Arts and Sciences and was themed "Empowering minds as we honor our traditions of excellence"

The honors convocation recognized over 1000 students for their academic excellence during the 2004 school year. In order to be selected for participation in the program students had to have made the university honor roll by maintaing a grade point average of 3.5 or higher.

## Southern University honors Johnnie Cochran

Southern University held a memorial ceremony for famed lawyer Johnnie L. Cochran Jr., who established a scholarship at the Southern University Law Center and was keynote speaker at both the Southern University at Shreveport spring commencement in 2001 and at the commencement on the Baton Rouge campus in

Cochran, who became a household name when he defended O.J. Simpson against murder charges, died of a brain tumor March 29 at age 67.

The ceremony was held the next day at noon in the university's Law School Atrium and was attended by law students. faculty and staff.

A proclamation in honor of his contributions to the Southern University Law

Center, the black community and the legal profession was presented by Edward "Ted" James, president-elect of the Student Bar Association, and by Eric W. Claville, Southern University Law School Division representative for the American Bar Association.

"He was truly a figurehead in the law; he made great bounds [in] making a place for African American attorneys to be recognized as having great accomplishments in defense." Tawnii Cooper-Smith, a law student from Mashantucket, Conn., and Student Bar Association representative, said.

"He was a great lawyer and a great humanitarian. I admired his work that he did in the community and where he stood when he represented not just the "O.J.s" but the "No Js" and I really respected that," Claville said. "It's great that now his peers, colleagues and his family will re-

member him [for] that." Cochran, a Shreve-

port, La., native, established the Johnnie L. Cochran Sr. Scholarship for UCLA African American males (known as Cochran Scholars); and scholarships at the University of New Mexico School of Law and at the South-

ern University Law Center.

"Rarely are we privileged to encounter an individual of Mr. Cochran's caliber. When we do, [we] must savor the moment," said Edward R. Jackson, chancellor of Southern University at Baton

"It is a great loss for us to lose such an important figure in the law system, and his presence was felt by all students, especially African Americans working and studying in the field of law. He was inspirational, a true hero, a modern-day hero for the big man as well as the little man.

He showed he worked for people as important as O.J. Simpson as well as

"the common guy walking on the street", and that is what was really special about him," Charlee Renaud, a law student from Opelousas, La., said.

Speaking at the memorial ceremony were Freddie Pitcher Jr., chancellor of the

Southern University Law Center; Saul Simmons, vice chairman of the Student Bar Association and Derrick Kee, outgoing Student Bar Association presi-

A copy of the proclamation was to be sent to the Co-

chran family "He was a very special person and will be greatly missed," Leon Tarver, president of the Southern University System, said. "He was fond of all of SU, he knew a lot of people from SU in his personal and professional life and he was always available to help.

The University College Basketball Association's season has come to an end and with a big finish. The men and women's championship games were held last week and buildings 44 and 45 came out on top. Both games were very entertaining and kept spectators at the edge of their seats until the last minutes of the game. At the end of both games, the championship teams were presented with a trophy.

The first game was a battle between the women's buildings 44 and 39. Both teams have proved throughout this season that they belong in this game. After losing their first game of the season to building 48, 21-12, they bounced back and defeated buildings 37 and 40 to advance to the championship. They have been led by Mishawn Robertson who has been one of the leading scorers on the team throughout this season. Building 39, led by Briana Moutlet, arguably the women's MVP, looked to finish up their undefeated season with the bragging rights of being ranked number one.

It was a slow start for building 39 in the first half, scoring only four points from the field. Luckily Moutlet was five of ten from the free throw line, which kept close behind 44's growing lead. Besides their foul trouble 44 had five of their eight players score in the first half, which gave them their four point lead at the end of the half. Robertson and Moutlet tied with five points each at the half.

Nahyamka Skipper and Monique Francis began to step up for 39 and keep them in the game. 44's four-point lead at the half slowly decreased, and it turned into a one possession game. score of 13 to 5. Early in the first inning, both teams were scoreless and combined for only one


second inning, Prairie View stunned the Tigers with 5 hits and 5 runs bringing the score to 5-o.

She believes self-esteem issues play a part in the rising number of blacks with AIDS. 'When you got those

types of issues, you're less likely to have protected sex." Akin said. Media may also play a in how students view sex.

'One of the things the media tells them is that sex equals love. Sex does not equal love," Billings said. With HIV, she said, "the reality is that sex equals death, disease and poverty.'

Gwendolyn Mann, director of health services at Alabama State University, believes more blacks may be diagnosed with HIV simply because people study blacks more

Chanel Reed is afraid of what the future may hold for her and other blacks. She wants a reversal in the rate of HIV infections among blacks. 'I hope it does calm

down because that's going to kill everybody," Reed says.
