Effective at once, Mr. H. A. Perkins, Supervisor of Buildings and Grounds, has been designated to be in charge of the Auditorium-Gymnasium. The building will normally be available for use as follows:

Mondays thru Saturdays - 7:00 A. M. to 12:00 Midnight

Sunday - 8:00 A. M. until close of Morning Worship Services

6:00 P. M. until close of Vesper Services

Individuals and groups desiring to use the building for purposes other than regular scheduled classes, varsity basketball practice, and the activities listed in the Master Schedule, must secure proper authority by executing an application form in advance. This form may be obtained from the Office of Buildings and Grounds (Old Music Studio) and when properly approved will constitute your authority to use the building. All student groups must be accompained by a faculty supervisor who will be available during the entire time that the students are in the building.

The above procedure has been designed to facilitate operation of this much-used building, and your cooperation will be appreciated.
