HBCU's full of **Black engineers**

The National Science Foundation estimates this nation will need 700,000 more technologists over the next 30 years than current projections indicate we will have.

Fortunately, an excellent source of future engineers is waiting to be tapped - the nation's 107 historically black colleges and universities.

From 1975 to 1987, six black institutions increased their engineering graduates by 156 percent.

Yet black engineers today make up less than one percent of all engineer graduates from colleges and universities.

The defense industry is taking steps to increase those statistics, reports the Electronic Industries Association (EIA). Many companies have entered into active partnerships with historically black colleges.

Tapping the potential of historically black colleges and universities not only makes sense, it can help insure the nation's technological future.





"All they do is write parking tickets, and round up the drunks." Anonymous student expressing his own views of campus security.


