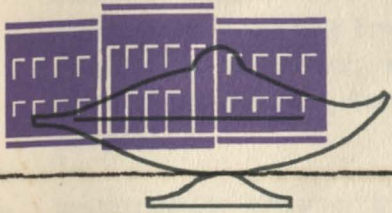

C. REGIONAL TRAINING PROGRAM FOR EXTENSION WORKERS

The College is proud to announce the 11th Annual Training Program for Extension Workers which is scheduled to be held on June 6-24. This

two-week short course will bring to our campus a large number of extension workers from all parts of the South. They will study and fellowship together, exchanging ideas and experiences, and working toward increasing their effectiveness in services to rural and farm people.

D. NATIONAL SCIENCE FOUNDATION

A high light of the summer session will be offerings in Biology, Chemistry and Mathematics both for secondary school teachers and for talented high school students. These programs will run throughout the first six weeks and are sponsored in cooperation with the National Science Foundation. Also in the area of science, the workshop for Elementary School Teachers is being offered during the period June 6-24.

E. SCHOOL ADMINISTRATORS' CONFERENCE

The annual summer conference for school administrators is scheduled for Monday, June 27. The theme is, "The Function of School Administrators in the Development of a Healthy Outlook and Program Designed to Meet the Challenge of the Sixties." A feature of the program will be a symposium consisting of a superintendent, principal, supervisor, school board member and a teacher.

F. READING CLINIC

A three-week Reading Clinic is scheduled for July 18-August 5. This new offering will take the place of the Reading Conference scheduled in the Summer Bulletin for June 23-24. Mr. Harry W. Lewis, Director of the Reading Clinic for the public schools of Washington, D. C. will serve on the staff of this clinic.


H. CONGRATULATIONS
