

# B. HOMECOMING

Prairie View Homecomings are getting bigger and better each year, and 1960 will not be an exception. With preliminary activities planned for Friday, November 4, the Homecoming season will cover the entrie weekend of November 4-6.

The theme of this year's observance is "Prairie View's Role in Cultural Development." The giant Homecoming parade and other activities will center around this important theme. The local Alumni Club and the General Alumni Association are in charge of several special programs during this period.

# C. AMERICAN EDUCATION WEEK

The Department of Education will furnish the leadership for our observance of American Education Week which is scheduled for November 6-12. The theme is "Strengthen Schools for the Sixties."

American Education Week has been observed annually since 1921. Its purposes have always been (1) informing the public of the accomplishments and needs of the public schools and (2) securing the cooperation and support of the public involving school problems.

# D. VETERANS DAY

A Veterans Day program will be sponsored by the Department of Military Science on November 11. The Veterans Club will participate in this program and the speaker for the occasion will be announced within a few days.

# E. DEBUTANTES' BALL

The Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority graduate chapter will sponsor its Annual Debutantes' Ball on November 12. Twenty-eight young ladies will be presented at the Ball which continues to be a highlight of our social and cultural events.

#### F. NATIONAL BOOK WEEK

The W. R. Banks Library will observe National Book Week on November 13-19. This is a significant occasion which has been nationalized throughout the United States and Canada. In addition to the encouragement of year-round reading, the purposes of Book Week are (1) to foster an appreciation for good books and (2) to encourage the usage of books as primary sources of intellectual growth and cultural development. # O. IN CLOSING

The President of Northern Michigan College was asked what he thought was the most important public relations problem facing colleges of teacher education. This is his answer:

"We must better inform the public of the importance of the teacher upon whom we depend to convey the basic values of knowledge, judgment, integrity, and responsibility. We cannot educate without teachers, and we need the best minds and the best teachers possible to do our job properly. In the words of Henry Brooks Adams, "A teacher affects eternity; he can never tell where his influence stops." Much has been said about the need for attaching prestige to the teaching profession. One of the best ways to generate prestige, it seems to me, is to bring into the profession the type of people who will be respected for their intelligence, their sense of purpose, and their qualities as understanding and sympathetic human beings."
