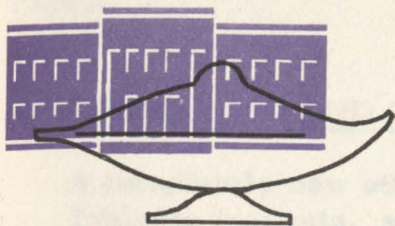

B. THE 51ST SUMMER SESSION

The 1961 Summer Session opens with registration on June 5. As in previous years, we are expecting another outstanding summer program. Enrollment prospects are good, and we have scheduled many special offerings for school personnel which should add up to a very challenging summer session for both students and faculty.

C. COUNSELING AND GUIDANCE INSTITUTE

A completely new offering for the summer is the Counseling and Guidance Training Institute, scheduled for the first six-weeks term. The College has received a grant of \$26,000 from the U. S. Office of Education to conduct the Institute which will feature a full-time instructional program of high professional quality for secondary school teachers preparing to become counselors. Our Institute is one of several nation-wide projects of the National Defense Act of 1958.

D. SCIENCE AND MATHEMATICS

The College will continue its several special programs in the fields of Science and Mathematics. In addition to the offerings of the past three summers, an Institute for Elementary School Mathematics Teachers has been added, along with a program of research participation of high school teachers.

Emphasis has been given in recent months to the improvement of training which would prepare our young people for a better showing on these national tests, which are designed to find the best college students for federal service.


G. STAFF MEETING
