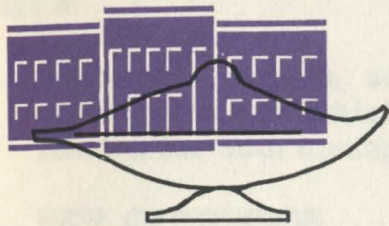


F. STAFF MEETING
