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

E. LANGUAGE ARTS WORKSHOP AND READING CLINIC

A workshop in Language Arts with emphasis on Reading instruction on the elementary level is scheduled for a three weeks period beginning July 16. Specialists in the area of Reading who will serve during the workshop period are Mrs. Mae C. H. Porter, staff member of the Reading Clinic, Washington, D. C. Public Schools; and Dr. Leo Fay, professor of Education at Indiana University. Several outstanding consultants representing Texas colleges and universities and the Texas Education Agency will also be available for this program.

The Reading Conference is scheduled on August 2.
