#### I. IN CLOSING

President Johnson's education proposals are designed to advance the dominant theme of his Administration: That improving the quality of American life begins with learning. Thus, the President has asked Congress to enact educational measures to provide:

- 1. Aid for public schools serving low income families.
- Assistance for students in both public and private schools.
- Scholarships and guaranteed loans for needy and able college students.
- 4. Laboratories and learning centers to improve the methods and content of instruction.
- 5. Help for cities seeking to build basic community facilities and neighborhood centers of health and recreation.
