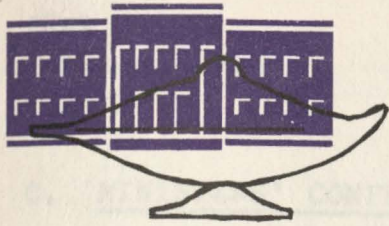

C. MINISTERS' CONFERENCE

The religious denominations at the College will sponsor a continuing education training institute for town and rural ministers on February 2-3. The theme of the two-day conference is "Developing Human Resources Through Social and Economic Opportunity."

The Department of History will sponsor several programs and activities in observance of Negro History Week on February 6-19. The theme is "Freedom From Racial Myths and Stereotypes Through Negro History." The Department of History is calling for the cooperation of all departments and student organizations at the college. These groups--Religious, academic and social--are asked to highlight Negro achievement through lectures, films, demonstrations, exhibits and programs throughout all classes and club activities during the observance period.

E. CHORAL CLINIC

The Department of Music is sponsoring its annual High School Choral Clinic on Saturday, February 12. This event has been growing each year and is expected to be another large and successful affair this year.

F. STATE BASKETBALL TOURNAMENTS

I. IN-CLOSING


Educating our entire citizenry to a concerned awareness of and involvement in the need for international cooperation is of crucial importance.

INSTITUTION RESEARCH PROGRAM

Allotments of institutional research grants to faculty members, for this year, were made from a total budget of \$30,947.00. Fourteen faculty members are participating as chief researchers in this program. The latest issue of the Prairie View Panther carried the names of these persons and the titles of their research projects.

Before the close of the year, each researcher will be expected to submit a report on his work, leading to the compilation of a Research Bulletin of the College. The date for submitting these reports will be announced soon.

Funds for the present year are exhausted. Preparatory to the program for next year, 1966-67, project proposals should be submitted by June 1, 1966, for consideration by the Committee on Review and Evaluation of Faculty Research Projects. Membership of this Committee is as follows:
