

Wolf, Professor of Education at Queens College, Brooklyn, New York, will be the speaker at a special Finer Womanhood program sponsored by the Epsilon Lambda Zeta Chapter of Zeta Phi Beta Sorority, Inc., on Sunday, March 6 at 11:00 a.m. Dr. Wolf, immediate past International Grand Basilens of Zeta Phi Beta Sorority, was the first Education Chief in the U.S. House of Representatives.
