COLLEGE GRANTS RECEIVED

The following grants of approximately \$130,000 for special projects have been approved for the college during the month of December.

NASA Grant (\$12,890) -- for "A Research Study of Six Developing Institutions of Higher Education to Identify and Catalog their interests of NASA and its Affiliates," under the direction of Dr. I. V. Nelson.

National Science Foundation - (\$9,770) to conduct a Summer Science Program in Chemistry for High School Students. Dr. E. E. O'Banion will direct the eleventh annual project and Mr. W. E. Reid will serve as Co-director.

NSF - (\$37,489) to conduct the 10th Summer Institute in Biology, Chemistry, Physics and Earth Science for Secondary Teachers. Dr. E. E. O'Banion, Director.

STUDENT FINANCIAL AIDS NEAR \$2 Million

A recent report by Dr. T. R. Solomon, Dean of Students, indicates that 2,175 Prairie View students are currently receiving a total of \$1,807,673 in various types of loans and grants. The Texas Opportunity Plan (T.O.P.) is by far the largest doner. Other financial aid funds include Work Study, the National Defense Loan, Educational Opportunity grants and U. S. Student Aid Fund.

CENTENNIAL COUNCIL MEETS

Prairie View A&M College Centennial Council held its second general meeting on December 14, at Hotel America in Houston.

Highlights of the meeting—a fact finding conference—includes the formation of an ad hoc committee to administer the council while a permanent chairman is being selected; President Thomas' statement of board goals and mission of the college; and the "down-to-work" sessions of the four task Force groups. Each Task Force Group acted upon position papers prepared by local faculty committees and made plans for continued study in the various areas of college responsibility.

STUDENTS TO PAY FEES FOR FULL SEMESTER

Beginning with the Second Semester, all students receiving grants and loans will be required to pay fees on a full- semester basis.

ROTC CADETS AND BAND MARCH IN BRYAN

The Pershing Rifles Drill Team, Firlettes and Color Guards joined the College Band in representing the college at a special parade in Bryan, Texas on December 7. Prairie View students paid their own transportation and performed in a most laudatory manner.
