> On Jan. 20, one of his campaign promises came true.

"It was an honor, that we deserved," said Lance Williams, a freshmen who plays the tuba in the Marching Storm.

Williams and 214 other members of the band, as well as 15 staff members, headed to Washington, DC with just a few days of practice.

But the award-winning band worried less about practicing and more about

the logistics of the trip. "We performed songs that we were already familiar with,"said Jimmy Smith, head drum major and music education major.

"Most of our practice time was spent fine tuning and marching to increase our stamina."

Advisors and university officials spent their time mapping out a financial plan.

The bulk of the financial responsibility was assumed by the university and the other portions of the trip were offset by donations and support from the public.

According to Willie Tempton, Vice President of Financial Affairs, the trip cost about \$150,000. The official amount will not be available until later this month, after all of the trip's expenses are

After all these years of wondering when the city would accommodate students with more restaurants and shopping centers, plans are in effect.


With the ex pansion of U.S. Highway 290, it will just be a matter of time before more companies decide that they can make money near this college.

Stockholm, Sweden

(AP)- The European Union's top social affairs of-ficial criticized U.S. President George W. Bush's move to restrict U.S. funds to international family-planning groups involved in abortion. Bush imposed strict

restrictions Monday on U.S. funds to international family-planning groups involved in abortion through performing the surgery, counseling on abortion or lobbying foreign governments.

Plane hijacking

Aden, Yemen

A man, claiming to be a Sadaam Hussein supporter, hijacked a plane carrying U.S. ambassador and approximately 90 other passengers.

The pilot was in-structed to fly the plane to Djibouti.

All of the passengers and the ambassador were safely released from the plane using an inflatable emergency exit chute after the highjacker was subdued.

Caught in the act

Lima, Peru

A member of the congressional commission, probing former fugitive Peruvian spy chief Vladimiro Monstesinos, quit the investigating team after he was caught on a confiscated video taking money from Montesinos' home.

The video showed congressman Ernesto Gamarra tal camera from their bedroom accepting money from an anonymous person.

Upon a viewing of the tape by Judge Saul Pena, he decided to resign from the investigating committee.

•National• Women sentenced to prison

Pittsfield, Mass.

(AP)- Two North Adams women have been sentenced to prison for throwing an intoxicated man off a bridge.

Deborah Lefebvre and Stacey Thiede each received five-to-seven year terms at their sentencing Monday. Last week a Berkshire Superior Court jury found the women guilty of assault with intent to murder and assault with dangerous weapons.

North Platte man faces sexual assault

North Platte, Neb.

(AP)- A North Platte man has pleaded innocent to one court of first-degree sexual assault of a child and three counts of child pornography. David Lubash, 47,

was in Lincoln County District Court.

Police arrested Lubash after he picked up photographs he had developed at a North Platte store. Police said the photos are of nude girls ages 10 to 12.

Purdue student found dead

West Lafayette, Ind.

(AP)- The Tippecanoe County coroner's office is investigating the death of a 21year-old Purdue University student from Chesterton.

Laura Marie Williams' roommates found her dead in their off-campus apartment. She was last seen entering her room to rest. complaining that she didn't feel well

The woman had been drinking while celebrating her 21st birthday. It had not been determined if alcohol and drugs were a factor in her

Woman pleads

Roanoke, Va.

(AP)- A woman pleaded guilty to transmitting pornographic images of her 14-year-old relative on the Internet

Sandra Keels Sarkisian and her boyfriend, Robert Troncoso, used a digito transmit images of the 14year-old girl performing sexual acts through a Website called iFriends.

Both face up to 35 years in prison, with a minimum of 10 years, and fines of up to \$500,000.

Huntsville, Texas

(AP)- A warden was assigned Tuesday to the maximum-security Connally Unit in Kenedy, the state prison where seven convicts escaped last month.

Robert John Parker will become warden of the Connally Unit effective Feb. 1. Parker is now the warden at the maximum-security Allred Unit at Iowa Park.

Man arrested in deaths

Corpus Christi, Texas

(AP)- A man returning from jury duty Monday found the bodies of his wife, daughter and grandson. A 26-year-old man was in custody in the stabbings.

Luis Villegas, the ex-boyfriend of Erida Rosales, was arrested after neighbors reported they saw a man leaving the home in the woman's car

Villegas was also ar-rested for evading police.

Carcasses found on judge's land

Palestine, Texas

(AP)- A county election judge from East Texas was arrested Tuesday after authorities found the carcasses and bones of hundreds of cattle on his property.

Anderson County sheriff's deputies arrested Larry Nuel Mack of Palestine on misdemeanor charges of animal cruelty. As many as 300 animals may have died from neglect, officials said.

A meter reader reported seeing the dead cows.

Mack told law enforcement authorities that the U.S. Department of Agriculture foreclosed on his property several years ago after he fell behind on note payments. He said he did not have the financial means to feed the animals


The Giants' offense is led by controversial quarterback Kerry Collins. Collins was under fire several years ago for making racist comments against a former teammate.

Collins, like Lewis, had to fight off questions surrounding the incident but he has ad mitted his racist comments were related to alcoholism.


