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

Federal studies show fifteen passenger vans dangerous

van that is popular with college and so cial organizations received a government safety warning on Monday due to research that showed it was three times as likely to roll over when fully loaded.

The warning, which was issued by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, comes after several lives were lost during van accidents last year. Federal studies concluded that the vans are likely to roll over when they contain 10 or more passengers.

According to the study, if the vans are fully loaded, the vans' center of gravity shifts up and to the back. As a result, the risk of roll overs increases, especially if the driver performs a panic maneuver.

"You have a vehicle that behaves entirely differently than when they are lightly loaded," NHTSA spokesman Rae Tyson said. "There is nothing inherently

Woods claims 4th title

ne of the most influential African Americans in sports history has done it again. Tiger Woods made his mark in the sports world by winning the Masters on Sunday.

Woods is now the only player to own all four of golf's modern major championships simultaneously. He competed

against golf pros David Duval and Phil Mickelson, and grabbed the victory as he took his final putt and made it into the 72nd hole that increased his winning



He was awarded a check for over \$61,000 and will also receive a salary of \$22,000 a month.

Other benefits Barber will receive include: allowances for housing and food, 30 days with paid vacation each



According to Barber, the application process took many steps to complete but it was worth the work.

The application was a 15-page document that was sent to recruitment offices in Houston.

Next, Barber visited several of the Navy's ships and submarines to see if working on them was what he truly wanted.

Finally, he was flown to Washington, DC for an interview.



the world's most advanced nuclear training, and after completion, they may receive an additional bonus.

The nuclear training program begins with officer candidate school and ends with the officers being commissioned as ensigns in the Navy and beginning their active duty.

One year of advanced nuclear training follows, starting with six months of classroom training at a nuclear power school then six more months of hands-on training. PVAMU's Dr. Kelvin

Kirby, assistant professor in the Department of Electrical Engineering and deputy director of the NASA Center for Applied Radiation Research, has been instrumental in exposing students to programs in their fields, and has assisted many students in his department in receiving opportunities such as Barber's.







The university has adopted new guidelines which call for all drivers, including students and staff members, to attend driving classes that focus on how to handle dangerous situations as well as proper driving techniques.

In addition, the prospective driver must sign a list of rules and guidelines and complete a data sheet which includes a in-depth driving record.

According to federal law, schools are banned from purchasing or renting the vans for travel. However, colleges and universities are not banned from using the vans.

The vans identified by the NHTSA include the Ford Econoline E350, Ford Club Wagon E350, Chevrolet Express 3500, GMC Savana G3500, GMC Rally/Vandura G3500, Dodge Ram Van/Wagon B3500 and Dodge Ram Wagon B350.



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
