On May 11, 2002 many students will be graduating from many different disciplines, and will be ready and eager to tackle the job force, but worried that there are no jobs available because of the slow economy.

Well, is the falling economy, really the issue in why students don't have job offers? Maybe it could be interviewing skills, preparation for career fairs, or networking with the right people.

According to Bernard Haldane Associates, a slowing economy does not necessarily mean it's a bad time to look for a job. It suggest that this may be the best time to find the perfect job. Haldane

Associates says the key is in targeting the right companies and presenting yourself accordingly.

Here's a few tips provided by the Bernard Haldane Associates on teaching people how to market themselves successfully:

* **First things first-** Before launching a job search, access your interests, skills, and abilities. Then set clear career goals.

* **Paint a complete picture-** Your resume should clearly communicate what you have done, what you can do, and what you will probably do in the future.

* **Work in triplicate-** Create three versions of your resume: conventional rich action verbs describing your accomplishments, electronic designed for optical scanners

* **Network-** The vast majority of positions are never advertised. They are created specifically for talented individuals who catch the attention of decision-makers.

* **Embrace the Internet-** Nearly 70 percent of employers use the Internet for recruiting.

* **Prepare for interviews-** Be ready to discuss specific accomplishments, tell stories and use examples to make your point.

Since its beginning on December 4, 1906, Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Inc. has supplied voice and vision to the struggle of African-Americans and people of color around the world.

Alpha Phi Alpha, the first intercollegiate Greek-letter fraternity established for African-Americans, was founded at the Cornell University in Ithaca, New York by seven college men who recognized the need for strong brotherhood among African descendents in this country.

The visionary founders, known as the "Jewels" of the fraternity are Henry Arthur Callis, Charles Henry Chapman, Eugene Kinckle Jones, George Biddle Kelley, Nathaniel Allison Murray, Robert Harold Ogle and Vertner Woodson Tandy. The founders and

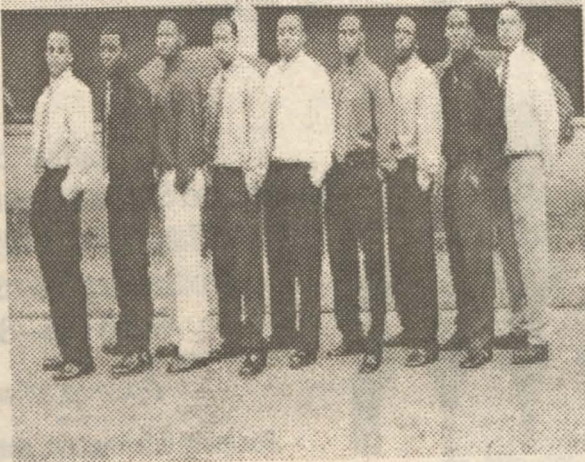
early leaders of the fraternity succeeded in laying a firm foundation for Alpha Phi Alpha's principles of scholarship, and uplifting humanity.

Alpha Phi Alpha chapters were developed at other colleges and universities; many of them historically black institutions, soon after the founding at Cornell. While continuing to stress academic excellence among its members, Alpha Phi Alpha also

recognized the need to help correct the educational, economic, political, and social injustices faced by African Americans.

The confidence and satisfaction of this dramatic progress has come about through Eta Gamma's pioneering achievements in scholarship, service and the development of fraternal spirit. Eta Gamma's proven

Teens get lack of iron
Houston, Texas

Teens that do not eat breakfast are twice as likely to have diets low in iron, a shortfall that could be hurting their grades.

"It's important for parents to realize that the nutrients teens miss when they're allowed to skip breakfast are rarely recouped during other meals," said Dr. Theresa Nicklas. In a study of 700 ninth graders Nicklas found that 19 percent skipped breakfast. Intakes of other vitamins are also higher among breakfast eaters.

Testosterone treatments
Houston, Texas

Hormone replacement therapy isn't just for women. Men of all ages can experience a shortage of androgen hormones, such as testosterone, causing loss of sex drive, impotency, muscle weakness and fragile bones.

For androgen-deficient men, hormone-replacement therapy can help strengthen libido and prevent osteoporosis. Pills to treat androgen deficiency have been available for years.

Spanish debate
Austin, Texas

AP- KVDA-TV, a Spanish-language television station in San Antonio operated by the network Telemundo, issued a statement over the weekend detailing its Spanish debate preparations.

It is proposing Feb. 24 or March 3 for the debate. A panel of questioning reporters would be bilingual journalists from major Texas newspapers, said Emilio Nicolas Jr., vice president and general manager of KVDA.

Unplanned genocide
Arusha, Tanzania

AP- A former Rwandan prime minister told a U.N. tribunal Monday that the 1994 genocide in his country was not planned but was caused by individuals using divisions between Hutus and Tutsis to pursue their own interests.

"If there was such a plan, I did not know it," Faustin Twagiramungu told the court at the International Criminal Tribunal for Rwanda.

Money saves apes
London, England

AP- Britain is contributing 175,000 pounds (\$260,000) to help prevent the extinction of some of the world's great apes, Environment Minister Michael Meacher said Monday.

He said the Department for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs and the Foreign Office were giving funds to the U.N. Environment Program's Great Ape Survival Project, known as GrASP.

Tankers, terror weapons
Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia

AP- Ships carrying huge loads of highly flammable natural gas could be hijacked by terrorists and used in suicide attacks, a global piracy watchdog warned Monday.

Forged ship and crew travel documents can be easily obtained for tankers carrying oil or liquefied gases, facilitating their use by terrorists "to undergo suicide missions for their cause," the International Maritime Bureau's Piracy Reporting Center said.

Investigation begins
Washington, D.C.

AP- U.S. forces have returned to investigate claims they killed the wrong people in a raid in Afghanistan, and they should apologize on the spot if the claims prove true, Secretary of Defense Donald H. Rumsfeld said Monday.

U.S. soldiers have gone to the area in Uruzgan province where special forces killed 15 or 16 people and arrested 27 in a nighttime raid two weeks ago, Rumsfeld told a Pentagon press conference.

Lockheed gets contract
Syracuse, New York

AP- Lockheed Martin Corp. said Monday it received a \$50 million contract to provide Egypt with a maritime search-and-rescue system for the Gulf of Suez.

The system will complement a Gulf of Suez vessel-traffic information management system provided by Lockheed Martin through a 1998 contract. The system will be designed to provide the Egyptian Ministry of Transport with the capability to manage and respond to any maritime distress in the Gulf of Suez.

Lawyer fights INS
Reading, Pennsylvania

AP- The lawyer for four Tanzanian Boy Scouts detained since they walked away from a scouting jamboree last summer is asking the government to extend the boys' expired visas.

A judge in November ordered the government to release the youths, ages 15 to 17, saying that until their visas expired on Jan. 22 they were in the country legally and could not be detained.

allows you to appreciate not only your personal inner and

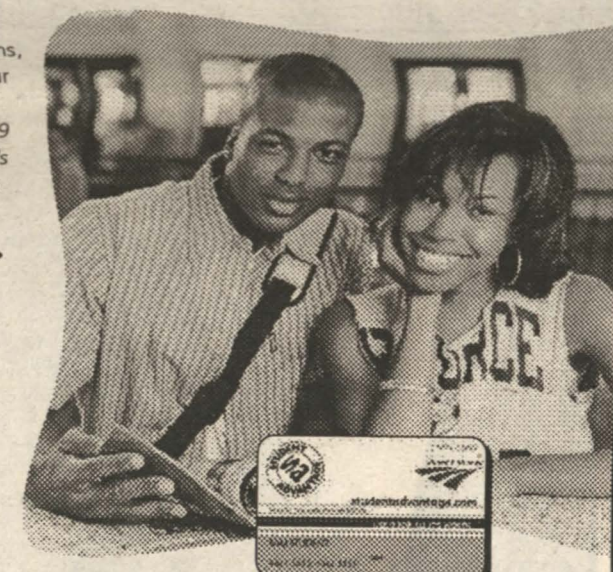
outer beauty, but also someone else's.

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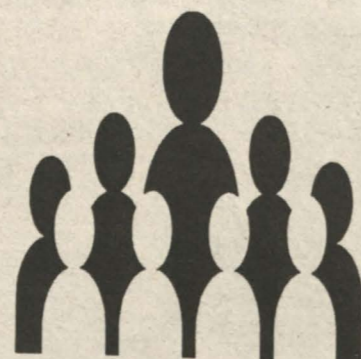
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The cultural upliftment of black people Alkebulan Society educating African-American students

By providing students with knowledge and the history of their organization, members of Alkebulan Society hope students will view them for their principles rather than their attire.

"Alkebulan Society is an open umbrella for all types," senior Eric "Equality" Blaylock said. "You don't have to wear daishikis or have locks (dreadlocks) to be in our society and these are common stereotypes we have encountered on campus."

Alkebulan Society is an organization, intended to supply "resources to empower one mentally, physically, spiritually, politically, economically, and socially."

"Alkebulan is also geared toward the cultural uplifting of black people," Blaylock said. "It aids in getting people to recognize and appreciate their culture."

Researched by Dr. Yossef Ben-Jochannan,

Alkebulan means "Mother of Mankind," or "Mother of Civilization," and is the non-European/Westernized name for the continent of Africa.

Alkebulan Society was called Men of Alkebulan at the time of its inception in 1998.

In fact, several men like Alzo Slade, Dr. Kevin Washington, Tyrell Anderson, Cranston Alkebulan, Jesse Muhammad, Kendal McDonald, Tony Browne,

Blaylock and others devoted themselves to the organization after recognizing the concerns black men faced daily on campus and in the community, and these issues needed to be addressed by and with black men.

They commenced to "hold ciphers" where knowledge was collective, and discussions and strategizing took place.

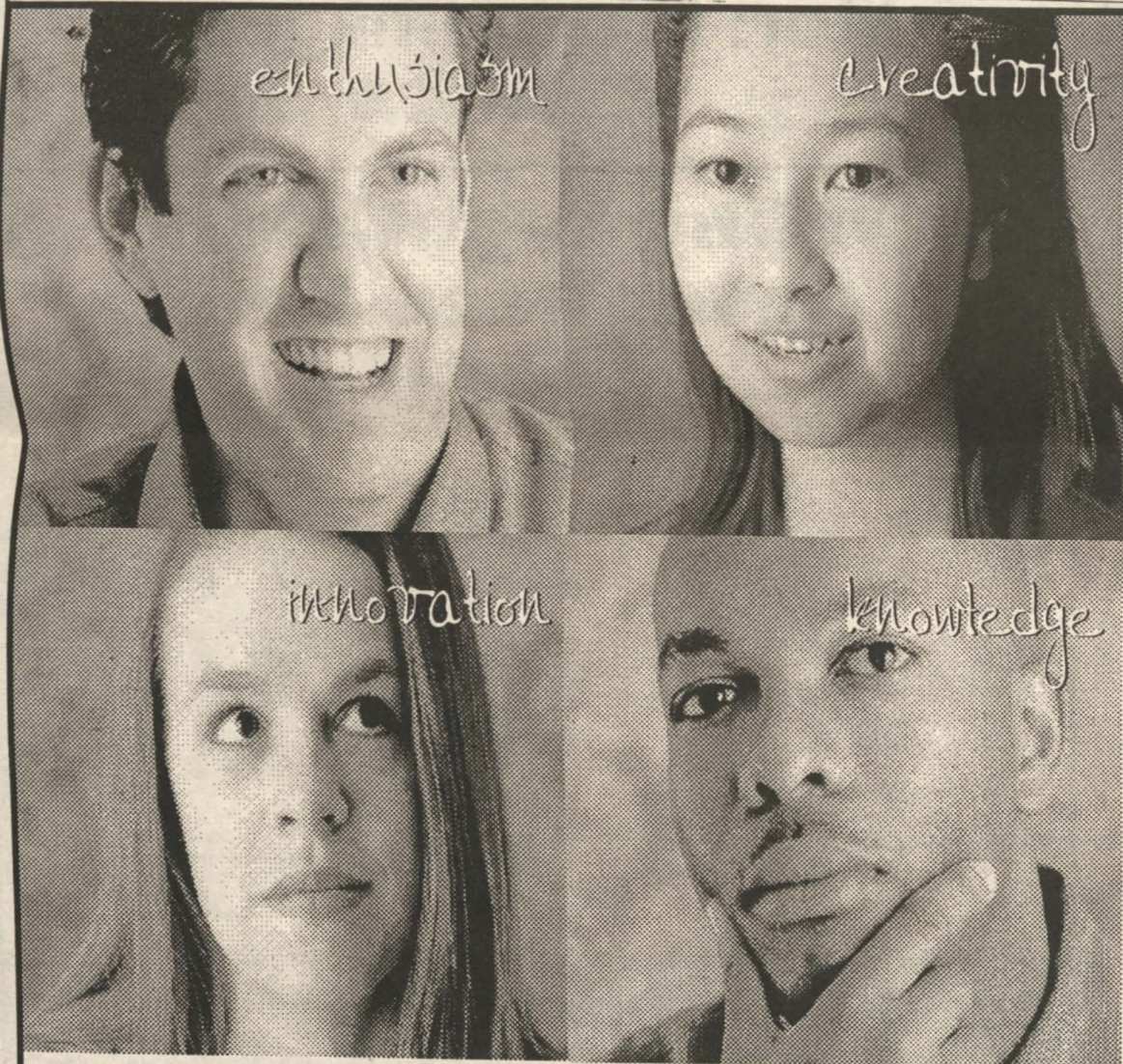
Men of Alkebulan later changed to Alkebulan

Society in order to include the "black woman into the plight for the empowerment of the black mind and spirit," Alkebulan veteran Tony Browne explained.

"Members of Alkebulan share a cooperative responsibility," Browne said. "Based on the African-centered community, Alkebulan is unique and the focus is communal."

Alkebulan has sponsored many events and pro-

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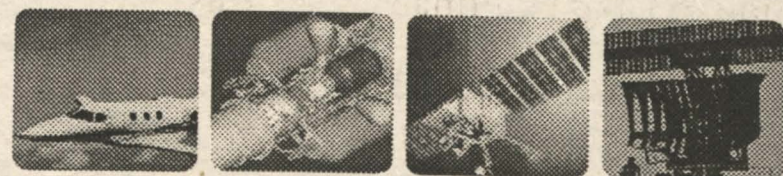

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Double All-Star Weekend

After arguably the best Super Bowl in NFL history sports fans are in for a treat this weekend.

Brady remains calm in the biggest game of year

Outside the Superdome, an unprecedented security force was protecting the NFL's showcase game. Inside was all of the singing and dancing that's come to be expected of the Super Bowl's lengthy pre-game show.

In the New England Patriots' locker room and inside Tom Brady's head everything was calm.

Waking up from a pregame nap just before gametime, the 24-year-old quarterback played with poise and efficiency on Sunday, leading the Patriots to their first NFL championship with a 20-17 victory over the St. Louis Rams.

The sore-ankled former fourth-stringer was named the game's Most Valuable Player, completing an improbable season for himself and a team that went from

worst to first in the AFC East and advanced through the playoffs with an air of destiny.

Brady completed 16 of 27 passes for 145 yards and led the Patriots on a 53-yard drive to the Rams 30 to set up Adam Vinatieri's game-winning 48-yard field goal with no time left. But mostly what Drew Bledsoe's former backup did was steer the offense with a steady hand and convert the opportunities handed him by the defense and special teams.

"You can't say enough about that kid. He has a tremendous amount of confidence. He has led this team," said David Patten, who caught Brady's 8-yard touchdown pass to make it 14-3 with 36 seconds left in the first half.

Although Brady completed only one NFL pass coming into the season, he is no stranger to big crowds, having played in front of 100,000-plus fans in college at Michigan. Perhaps that's why he wasn't

fazed by either the Super Bowl hoopla or the Rams, a season removed from a championship victory and considered "The Greatest Show on Turf."

"I kept telling myself all week that this was just another game, even though everything leading up to the game said it was a bigger game," Brady said. "But it just came down to playing good football, and that's what we did."

Brady had trouble holding onto the starting job at Michigan — one reason he wasn't picked by the Patriots until the sixth round in the 1999 draft. But coach Bill Belichick saw enough in him to keep him on the roster for all of last year as a rare fourth quarterback.

This summer, Brady started training camp as the No. 4 quarterback before being promoted to Bledsoe's primary backup. When Bledsoe

was hurt Sept. 23, an injury that kept him off the field for seven games Brady came on in relief and sparked New England's turnaround.

The Patriots, who went 5-11 in 2000, were 5-4 when Bledsoe was ready to return. Belichick made a half-hearted attempt at a quarterback competition, but after a loss to the Rams on Nov. 18, he decided he couldn't do that and adequately prepare for the week's opponent.

Brady led the Patriots to an 11-5 regular-season record, then keyed a 16-13 overtime win over the Oakland Raiders in the playoffs. But Brady sprained his ankle in the AFC championship game, and the Patriots needed to be rescued by Bledsoe.

When the time came to pick the starter for the Super Bowl, though, Belichick went back to Brady. Again, Bledsoe handled the news with grace.
