Cooperative Plan with Yale & Davenport Aired

President Thomas Invited to New Haven to DISCUSS INTER-INSTITUTIONAL Cooperation

Student Life TO BE Strengthened

Seeking ways and means of improving student life programs at the college, President A. I. Thomas, and Dr. George Stafford spent two days this week at Yale University conferring with officials concerning a cooperative arrangement with the famed New Haven institution and

Prairie View A&M. The plan would also involve Davenport Institute, a small private college in Grand Rapids, Michigan.

According to Dr. Thomas, the program proposed would center around experiences which encourage (1) the individual to

plan for his own development through college and beyond; (2) teachers and students to seek for meaningful relations between course and extra-course experience and life experience; (3) a community of scholars, inclusive of both faculty and students, by providing a common core of experience upon which significant mutual interest can be based.

The program would also encourage the awareness of a sequential cumulative impact and place emphasis on self-evalua-

tion. Yale and Davenport may contribute by providing graduate assistants in the area of student personnel work to do extended field work at Prairie View. Other personnel from these institutions, such as persons nearing retirement and those on sabbatical leaves might join the Prairie View staff for as long as practicable in order to build a program in student life.

It was also Dr. Thomas' feeling that inter-institutional re-

search proposals or other types of developmental projects could be presented for possible funding by federal agencies, individuals or private foundations.

Immediate assistance is sought for programs already scheduled for the ensuing summer session. These include rich activities for work-study students, a special program for talented high school students, Upward Bound, student leadership workshops, and staff development workshops.

Funeral Services Held For Dean H. E. Fuller April 21

Funeral services for Harry E. Fuller, dean of men, at Prairie View A&M College were held at 11:00 a.m. Friday, April 21 at St. Francis Episcopal Church, Prairie View.

A memorial service sponsored by the college was held Thursday night at 7:30 p.m. in the Health and Physical Education Building. The body will lie in the college auditorium Friday morning from 8:00 - 9:45 a.m. All classes were suspended throughout the morning.

Dean Fuller died of a heart attack Monday, April 17, in a Houston hospital. He was 58 years of age.

Born in Ellicott City, Maryland, Mr. Fuller is a 1931 graduate of Hampton Institute in Virginia. He came to Prairie View in 1933 and was employed as an instructor of painting and decorating in the division of Industrial Education. He also studied at New York University and was named dean of men in 1949.

Prairie View male students paid a special tribute to Dean Fuller, Sunday, April 9 (the day before he became ill) during a luncheon opening the observance of Men's Week on Campus. He received the United Men's Congress meritorious Award for outstanding contributions to that organization and to the men of Prairie View.

The Reverend James T. Moore, vicar at St. Francis — Prairie View officiated at Fri-

day's services. The Reverend Lee C. Phillip, college chaplain was in charge of the Memorial Service Thursday evening. Singleton's Funeral Home, Hempstead was in charge of arrangements. Burial was held in Sunnyside, Texas.

Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Rubye C. Fuller, home economics teacher at Prairie View High School; a daughter, Mrs. Edwinlyn C. Gordon, Prairie View; one brother, James Fuller of Bethlehem, Pennsylvania; three sisters, Mrs. Louise Gardner and Mrs. Nellie Snell, both of Pittsfield, Mass. and Miss Clementine Fuller, Newark, N. J.; a grand-daughter, Elizabeth Annette Gordon of Prairie View; and aunt, Mrs. Achsah Hammond of Ellicott City, Maryland.

College Receives \$1 Million Grant

Prairie View A&M College received a Department of Labor grant for \$1,027,718, Senator Ralph Yarborough announced.

The project will provide 280 unemployed workers with training as auto mechanic, cook, press (machine and dry cleaner), landscape nurseryman, meat cutter, clerk-typist, stenographer, keypunch operator or digital computer. Training will be conducted at the college.

This is a manpower development and training project.

Honors Convocation Set For May 1st

The Alpha Pi Mu Chapter of the Alpha Kappa Mu Honor Society will hold the Thirteenth Annual Honors Convocation at 11 a.m. on May 1 in the Field House. The Convocation this year will feature an address by a genuinely distinguished academician, Doctor Edmund Gordon of Yeshiva University in New York City. 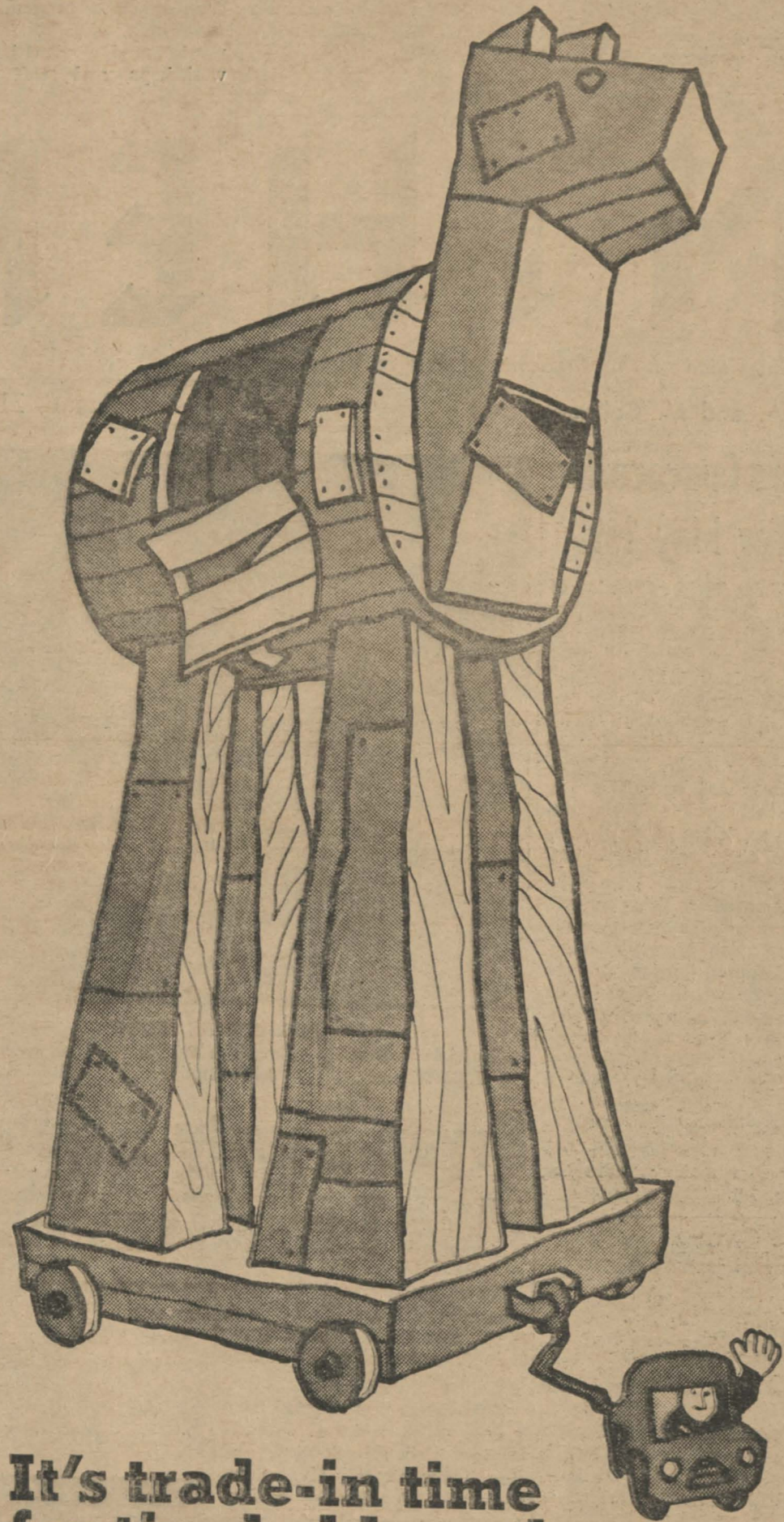
MUHAMMAD ALI ON CAMPUS — Muhammad Ali who made a recent appearance on our campus is seen giving his views on Black Power in the Field House.

Secretary's Father Lost on Fishing Trip

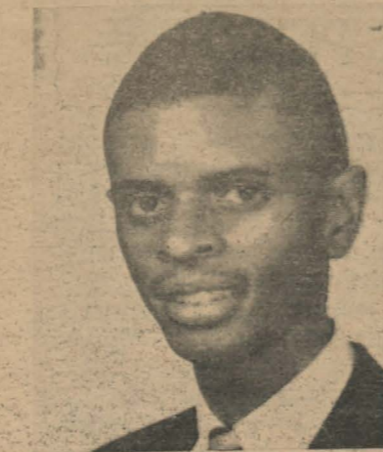

PV Gets Special Ed. Grants For Seniors

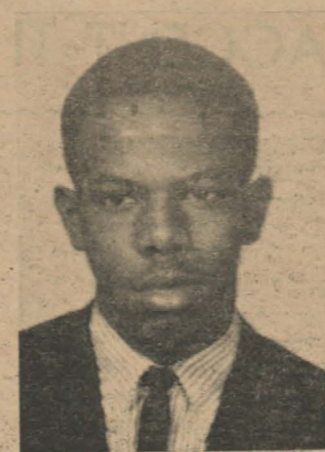
Prairie View A & M College has received \$14,400, for fellowship and traineeship grants for the preparation of professional personnel in the education of the handicapped children.

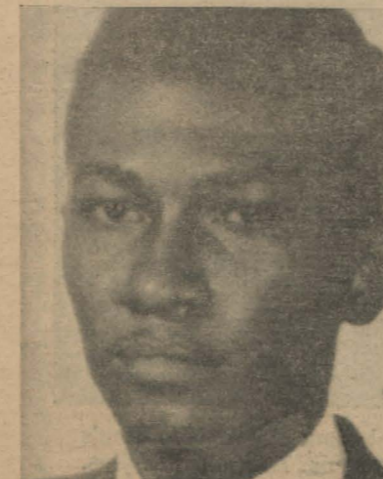

Dean Fuller truly belonged to Prairie View. As Dean of Men, he wrestled with problems day and night -- not easy problems, but many of the nature that strong men would be happy to pass.

His success was based on a simple code of "Fairness." Despite the multitudinous disciplinary problems facing him day by day, he was always level-headed and quite compassionate. He could be very firm, but almost always "gentle." He combined very successfully the "Honey and the Rock."

He will be remembered by his colleagues and the Prairie View family as a "rock of dependability," -- one who could be counted upon for any movement aimed at improving the college and the community in which he lived.

Prairie View will always cherish the memory of Dean H. E. Fuller.

Congratulations To Honor Students

Congratulations to all the students who were fortunate, or should we say diligent, enough to make the first semester honor roll. A total of 249 belong to this rather elite group of students posting semester averages of 3.0 or above.

Though it is quite discernible that many more could have or should have been in this category, it is indeed comforting to be able to scan a list of 249 students who academically elevated themselves above the "masses".

These students will be honored at the annual Honor's Day Convocation sponsored by the Alpha Pi Mu Chapter of the Alpha Kappa Mu National Honor Society on May 1, 1967.

It is often heard that "grades don't mean everything." This may very well be true, but rest assured that there are instances where your academic achievements will be a definite asset and often a determining factor in your favor. In light of all this, Alpha Kappa Mu would like to again commend each of you for your academic triumph and invite many more to walk beside you in the next Honor's Day Convocation Processional.

An Education Bargain Worth Keeping

While the draft gets plenty of attention in Congress, a small, valuable, but little-known program may die of congressional inattention. It is the National Teacher Corps.

The Teacher Corps serves in the combat areas of American education--in the schools of the slums and the rural poor. In 29 states, its 1,200 corpsmen pay special attention to "culturally deprived" children, whose schooling must provide values and training that their homes do not. Teacher Corps teams--each consisting of a veteran of about five years' experience in slum schools, aided by from three to ten young teacher interns--go into these schools by invitation only. They work under the close supervision of community school officials, who can fire or transfer them on a day's notice. There are plenty of safeguards, in short, against federal government meddling in local schools.

But because it lacks any effective lobby on Capitol Hill, the Teacher Corp's budget was shrunk to \$7.5 million, which runs out this June.

Outside of Congress, the Teacher Corps has won impressive support from the National Education Association and the American Federation of Teachers. Practically every school which has corpsmen this year wants more of them next year. The Teacher Corps needs a supplemental stopgap appropriation of \$12.5 million by the middle of April to set up summer training programs for the 2,400 new interns the Administration has recommended, and an additional \$36.5 million to carry the corps through the full fiscal year. At these prices, it remains the best bargain in the federal education program.

Study For Special Education Announced For 1967-1968

These traineeships provide for one year of full-time study, culminating in the Bachelor's degree, with provision for public school teacher certification. ELIGIBILITY and QUALIFICATIONS:

- (1) The applicant must have attained Senior Year Status at Prairie View A & M College by September 1967.
- (2) Be in good standing with the college
- (3) Have a minimum grade point average of 2.5
- (4) Have chosen either Special Education or Elementary Education as the major or minor

(5) Be able to graduate with a Bachelor's degree and meet the Texas standards for Provisional Certification to teach mentally retarded children not later than August, 1968.

(6) Be willing to declare an intention to pursue the program of study to completion and to teach mentally retarded children in a public school for a minimum period of two years.

Preference will be given to students manifesting a prior interest in a professional career in mental retardation by their previous selection of special education as an area of study.

STIPENDS: Trainees pay no tuition and fees and receive a stipend of \$1,600. No allowance is made for dependents.

APPLICATION DEADLINE: Application, transcripts of all college work, and all other supporting documents must be filed with the Chairman, Special Education Section, Education Department, Room 104, Education Building, not later than April 21, 1967.

HOW TO APPLY: Application forms should be requested from Chairman Special Education Section, Room 104, Education Building, Prairie View A & M. College, Prairie View, Texas.

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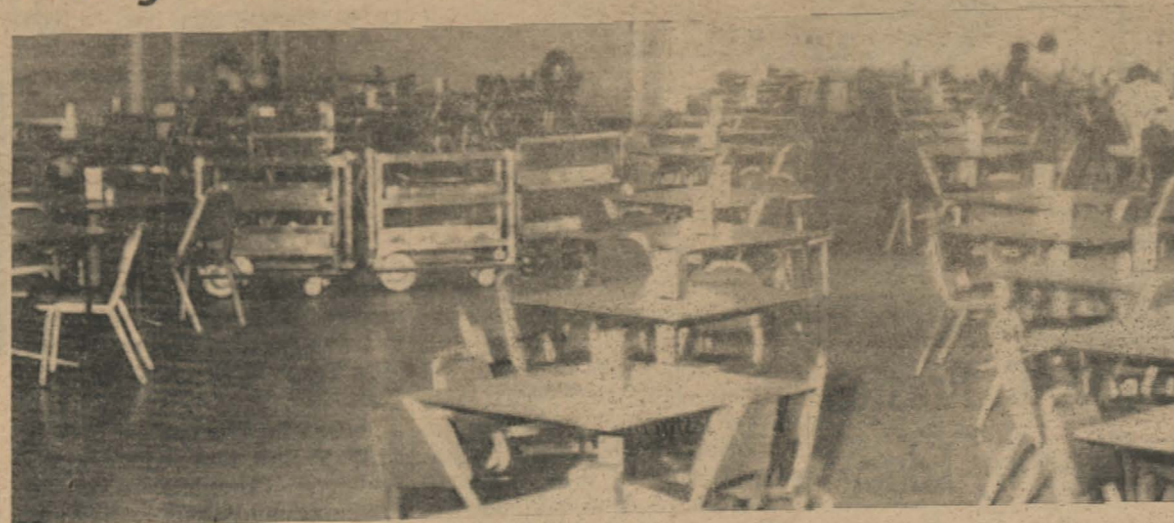
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Dining Hall Submits Resolutions
