PV Receives \$240,000 For Work-Study Program

Prairie View A&M College has been awarded a grant of \$240,372 in federal funds to help finance the work study program at the college. A total of 570 students will receive aid from this grant.

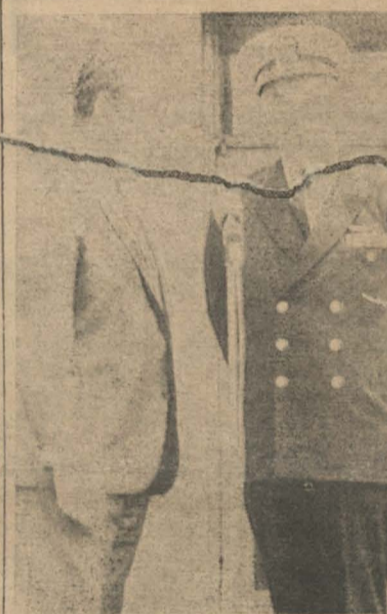
Senator Ralph W. Yarborough, D-Texas, announced that 93 institutions will receive grants which will be distributed by the schools to approximately 15,180 students who must work to finance their education. The funds from the U. S. office of Education were authorized by the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964, which Yarborough Co-sponsored.

On Tuesday the Senator announced the approval of \$7 Million for student scholarship pro-

grams on 81 Texas campuses. The work-study funds approved today will provide up to 85 per cent of student payrolls supervised by the individual schools during 1968.

These funds are added to the \$203,660 recently granted by the federal government for opportunity grants.

The purposes of Epsilon Pi Tau are to develop technical skills, promote social efficiency, and foster research.

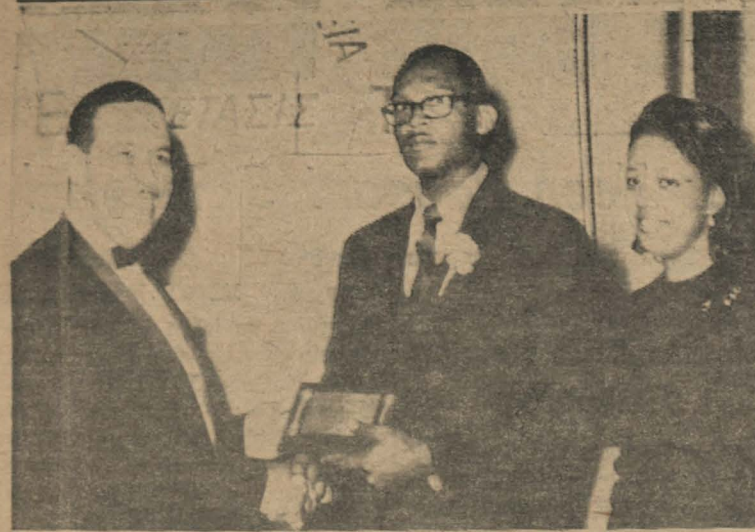

Former Nursing Dean Considered For Award

Two Houston - area nurses have been selected to compete for the Mary Mahoney Award given by the American Nurses' Association at its biennial convention meeting May 13 to 17 in Dallas, Texas. The award is given to a registered nurse for outstanding contribution in integration of education and opportunities for Negro nurses.

Nominees are submitted by state and district constituents of the American Nurses' Association, and after finalists are selected by a committee, a panel of distinguished citizens acts as judges for the award. The award will be presented at an impressive service on opening night of the convention where more than 8,000 nurses are expected to attend.

Mrs. Maida S. Brannon, a nominee from the Houston area, was former director of nursing, Prairie View A & M College, Prairie View, Texas. Mrs. Brannon, who was associated with Prairie View from 1928 until her recent retirement led the development of the program from a small school which offered limited opportunities to Negro students to a bachelor degree program. She encouraged full integration of the professional nursing association in Texas and, by attendance at meetings and other activities, succeeded in integrating many public facilities.

Mrs. Mildred Meade, also a nominee of Houston, Texas, has, through personal sacrifice and dedication, helped four young women through schools of nursing.

The award is named for Mary Eliza Mahoney who was the first Negro graduate nurse in the United States. Miss Mahoney received a diploma from the New England Hospital for Women and children in 1879 and worked more than 40 years as a nursing practitioner. She is honored as the first Negro to enter a school of nursing and as an outstanding student, nurse and citizen. Always, Miss Mahoney worked to improve the status of the Negro nurse in professional life.

The National Association of Colored Graduate Nurses established the Mary Mahoney award in 1936 in recognition of members who had made outstanding contributions to nursing. In 1951, NACGN was dissolved and turned its activities over to the American Nurses' Association in the belief that ANA always would be committed to eliminating discrimination against minority groups within the profession and at places of employment. ANA has presented the Mary Mahoney award since 1952.

Prairie View accumulated 12 points to Grambling's 3 to win Tennis Championship Team honors. Benjamin Wright claimed singles honors in tennis and teamed with Alvin Washington to enter the doubles final to win for the 1st time in two years all honors in the Prairie View host tournament. On the way to the singles title Wright defeated Liggan of Alcorn (6-0) (6-0); his teammate Washington of Prairie View (6-4) (6-3) and Calvin of Grambling (6-3) (6-2).

Robertson of Prairie View lost in the singles quarter finals round to Calvin of Grambling as He man Williams also of prairie View lost in the semi finals to the same player.

Prairie View's doubles teams Wright and Washington; Robertson and Williams met in the finals to determine the winner; the teams are in a discontinued match.
