

Miss Mahoney received a diploma from the New England Hospital for Women and children in 1879 and worked more than 40 years as a nursing practitioner. She is honored as the first Negro to enter a school of nursing and as an outstanding student, nurse and citizen. Always, Miss Mahoney worked to improve the status of the Negro nurse in professional

The National Association of Colored Graduate Nurses established the Mary Mahoney award in 1936 in recognition of members who had made outstanding contributions to nursing. In 1951, NACGN was dissolved and turned its activities over to the American Nurses' Association in the belief that ANA always would be committed to eliminating discrimination against minority groups within the profession and at places of employment, ANA has presented the Mary Mahoney award since
