





3. Read properly. Always read the paper at breakfast. It inhibits bolting. But do not read the front page. That is full of bad, acidmaking news. Read a more pleasant part of the paperthe Home and Garden section, for example.

For instance, in my local paper, The Westport Peasant, there is a delightful column called "Ask Harry Homespun" which fairly bristles with bucolic wisdom and many an earthy chuckle. I quote some questions and answers:

Q: I am thinking of buying some power tools. What should I get first?

- A: Hospitalization. Q: How do you get rid of moles?
- A: Pave the lawn.

Q: What is the best way to put a wide car in a narrow garage? A: Butter it.

- Q: What do you do for elm blight?
- A: Salt water gargle and bed rest.
- Q: What can I do for dry hair? A: Get a wet hat.






Golf And Tennis Teams To Open 1968 Season
