Prairie View ROTC Attends Summer Camp At Ft. Hood

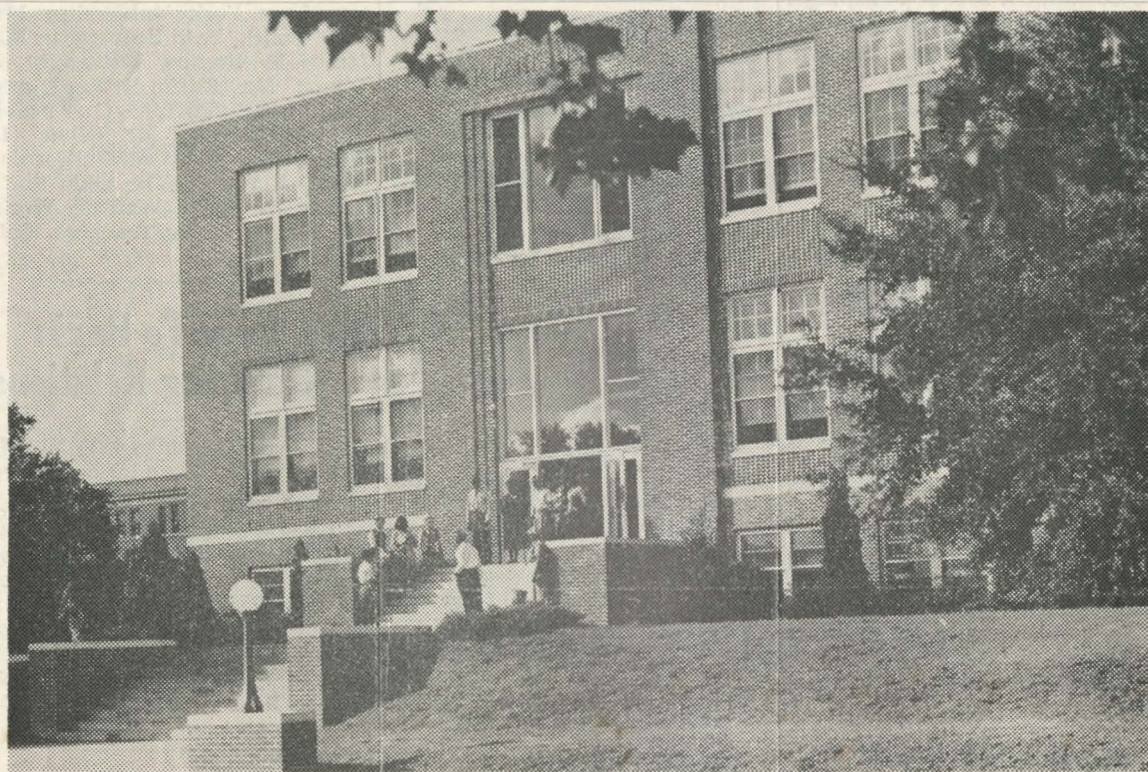

W. R. Banks Library

Since early in March of this year the W. R. Banks Library has been undergoing much needed plant changes. Air-conditioning of the entire building, with the exception of the Stack Room has been installed. This work was done under a contract which called for its completion by June 30, 1956. The contract was kept and those who wish to use the facilities of the library may do so now in "cool comfort."

Part of the wall between the Reserve Reading Room and the Graduate Study Room has been removed. The equipment and books now located in the east end of the Reserve Reading Room will be moved to the west end of this room. This will make reserved material more easily accessible to those who use the Graduate Study Room and will not impair the accessibility of the same materials to those who use the Reserve Reading Room. This arrangement will also make it possible for undergraduates students to be seated in the Graduate Study Room during the regular session of each year.

A new type of screen has been installed on the windows on the south and west sides of the Library which helps to keep the sun's rays out of the building on those sides. This type of screen is singular both in its structure and effectiveness.

Upon the completion of the installations, and remodeling and renovating processes now in progress the building will undergo interior decorations in areas needing such. The W. R. Banks Library will then become one of the most comfortable and beautiful library structures in the Southwest.

Much has been said and much more written about courtesy; yet we travel down the byways of life too hurried and hurried to observe its slightest rules.

Our paths cross and recross a hundred times daily, and we jostle against each other at every turn; yet in our blind effort to push ourselves to the fore we never say, "excuse me" or "I'm sorry."

We say things against each other that bruise the spirit; we make innuendos that can never be forgotten; we inundate each other's character, and yet when we meet face to face we are not even coldly polite.

If we want to lessen one's influence, we begin a political fight against him; if we want to lower one's ego, we wage a social fight against him; if we want to dampen his spirit, we carry on an intellectual fight against him; and if we want to destroy his character, we conduct a moral campaign against him. Professor Campbell Named Top Doctoral Degree Candidate

Doctor Candidate Professor Anne L. Campbell, head of the Department of English at Prairie View A. and M. College, was named top ranking candidate for the doctoral degree received during the 1955-56 school session at New York University.

Miss Campbell went to New York on April 27 to receive the citation from New York University during the 125th Founders Day convocation ceremonies of the University. Her degree was awarded in English and her dissertation was a language study dealing with relationships between the nature of language and socio-economic backgrounds of a group of Prairie View students.

Professor Campbell came to Prairie View A. and M. in 1932 as an instructor of English. She became acting head of the Department of English in 1944, was granted a leave to study and teach at New York University during the 1946-47 year, and returned to Prairie View where she was made head of the department in 1949.

Economic Ed To Hold Workshop

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Aggie Group Pay Recent Visit To Jackson Ranch

Prairie View A & M College students and faculty representing the School of Agriculture were recent guests of Jackson's Ranch near Anahuac where they enjoyed touring part of the 10,000 acre ranch; and were feted with all the barbecue they could eat; and saw demonstrated some real cattle raising activity.

O. R. Jackson and his two sons Owen and Warren, owners of the ranch invited the group. The trip was sponsored by The Agronomy Club at the college under the supervision of Professor Oliver Smith and James Kirkhill. A motorcade of 10 cars, about sixty persons made the trip.

The first part of the trip was spent in touring parts of the huge ranch. Mr. O. H. Jackson pointed out the many field crops and oil production on the place. The barbecue dinner was the highpoint of the day's events. Ranch hands Earl Rivers, Lee Carrington and J. D. Lewis helped with the serving.

Owen Jackson, rancher and a cattle buyer for several packing houses in the area, talked to the group about producing cattle for market. He expressed a need for better trained young men for cattle raising and all types of farming in Texas.

The visitors were able to observe a typical day's activity at the ranch as the owners and ranchers went about their work with a sizeable head of cattle. Spraying, injections, de-horning and castrations were among the many activities the visitors were able to see. Many of the students and a few faculty members joined in helping perform these chores. Some got a chance to ride horseback while others continued to eat barbecue and watched.

Both students and faculty members were high in their praise of the trip and thankful for an opportunity (the first for many) to observe a large ranching program in action. The hosts expressed pleasure in having the group, and talk was made about arranging an annual visit from Prairie View to the Jackson's ranch.

Community Health Extension Planned

Several Prairie View A and M College staff members are participating very actively in the county-wide program organized for the purpose of extending public health facilities in Negro communities of Waller County.

At an organizational meeting of the group called by Miss Sedalia Wilson, Public Health Nurse at Prairie View, during the month of March, and held on the Prairie View campus, means of assisting the college health program in order to render wider and more effective service to needy families in Waller County were discussed. Later sessions were held in Hempstead.

Specific objectives listed were: (1) to interpret the health program of the community; (2) to study community health needs; (3) to assist in providing for volunteer workers in well-child and maternity clinics; and (4) to assist in providing transportation for indigent families to clinics and other medical facilities.

Prairie View staff members on the committee were: C. A. Wood, co-chairman; Mrs. A. E. Charleston, Secretary; Mrs. Rosa Hynes, Director of Nursing Education; and Dr. E. B. Perry, Director, Public Health Program.



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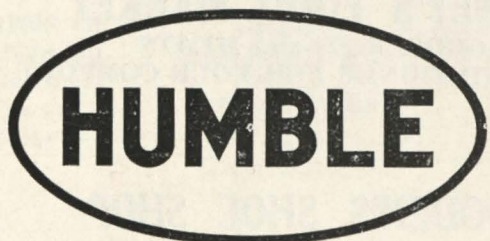
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Dr. Woolfolk's Article Published

Dr. George R. Woolfolk, College Historian at Prairie View A and M College, has had his most recent article, "Cotton Capitalism and Save Labor in Texas" published in The Southwestern Social Science Quarterly for June, 1956.

The historian's thesis, that the Negro was used for both "liquid" and "producer" capital in the South, is in different opposition

to other authors who contend that Negroes were used only for labor purposes.

"Although my primary interest is Urban Business History, I have found that the Southwest is virtually an untouched gold mine as far as historical data pertaining to the Negro is concerned," said the energetic writer.

As head of the Department of History and Philosophy, Dr. Woolfolk is collaborating with one of his graduate students, Marcus A. Freeman, in conducting a follow-up study, "Taxes and Slavery in Texas," which will be

completed in the near future. Research materials and data for the study were gathered in the State Comptroller's Office, Austin.

Also Director of Research at Prairie View, Dr. Woolfolk has been a member of the faculty since 1943.
