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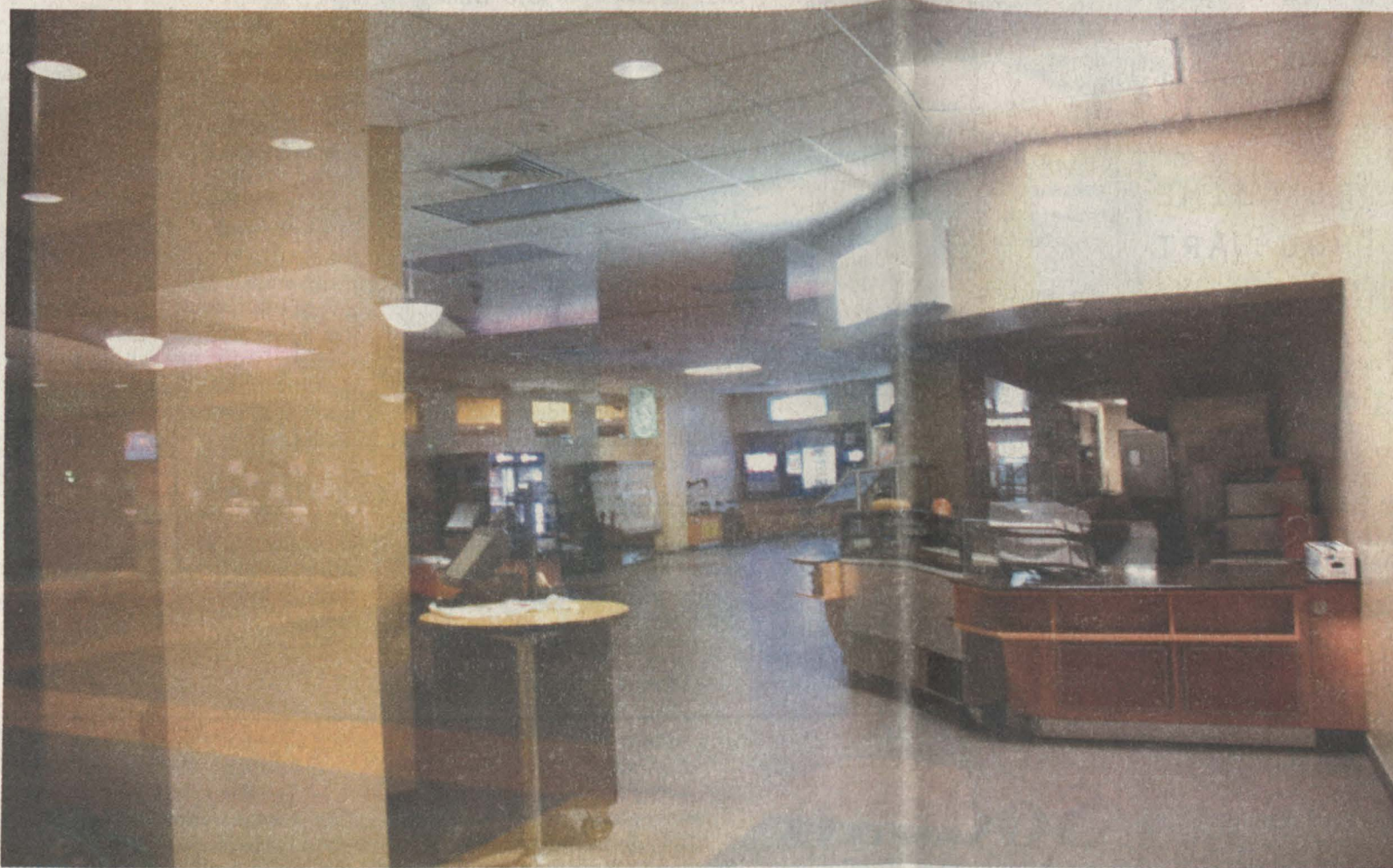

Unfriendly workers, overcharged meals, slow service, and charging for sauce are just some of the concerns that students have with Sodexo's dining services.

Some students say they are not happy with the service Sodexo provides in the Panther Grill and the MSC dining hall. Eating in the dining hall can be unappealing due to the food served, which forces students to go to the Panther Grill. Unfortunately, at

times, neither is satisfying due to bad or slow service.

"Personally, in my experience, some of the staff are nice but others seem like they don't want to be there," said freshman biology major Kerry Shelton. "They take their frustration out on the students."

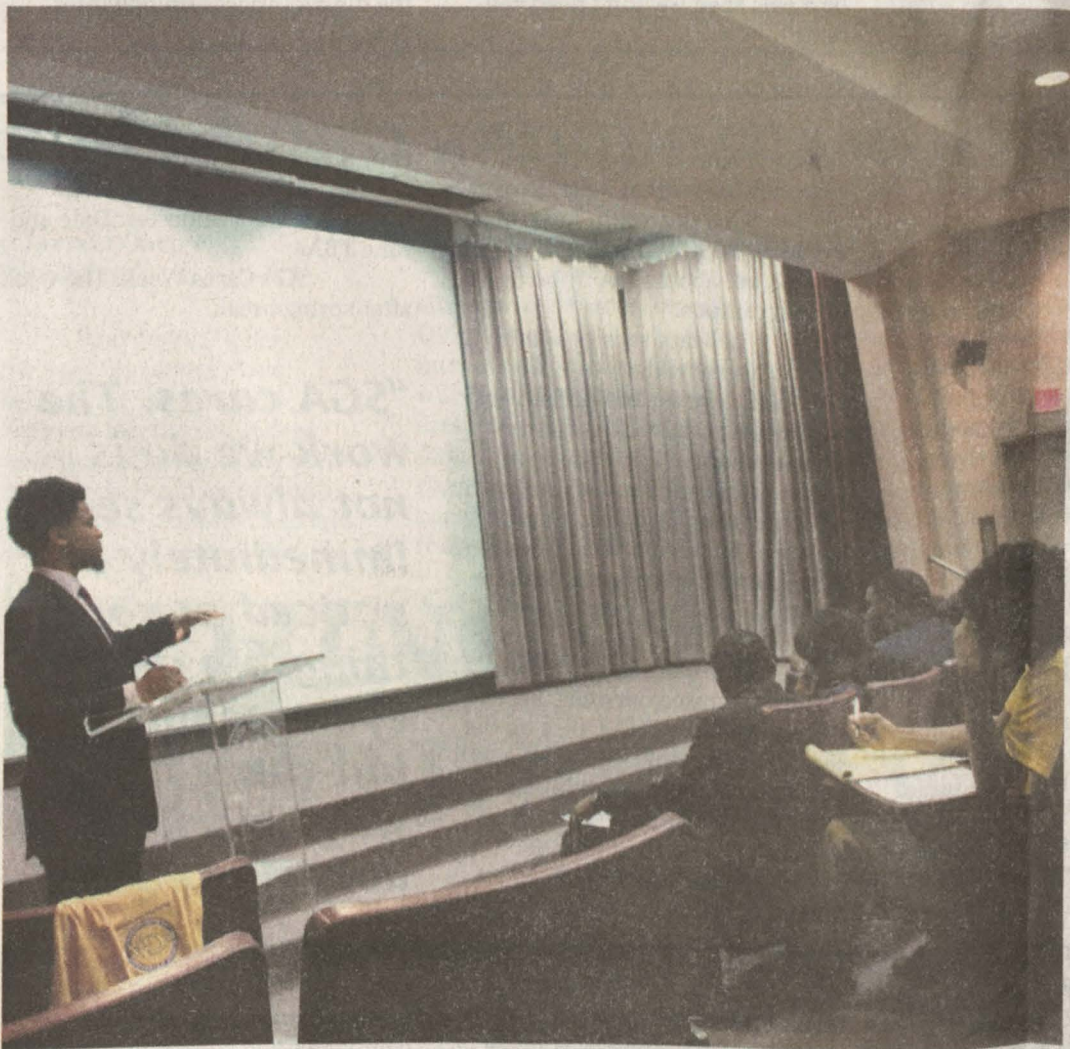

LeBeauf urges students to get involved, speak out

In response to questions about whether students have a voice on campus, and what progress the Student Government Association has made, on their behalf, SGA will be hosting a town hall meeting a town hall meeting Thursday, Feb. 19, called "What's up with SGA."

Some students are fully aware of the impact SGA has and the resources it provides, but other students aren't aware at all.

SGA President Sidney LeBeauf says, "I think my biggest concern is having the students speak up for what we want on campus. My purpose as president is to represent the student body's popular opinion, but it would be impossible to be an effective president if I do not hear what students would like to see. I am working on the SGA webpage to have a section where students can submit comments and concerns; that way we can start working on and updating students on those concerns."

Much of the debate on this topic comes from students who feel like they don't know how to make their voices heard, or whom to talk to about their concerns on campus.

Update on Brookside shooting case

On Feb. 3, a fatal shooting occurred at the Brookside Apartments in the city of Prairie View, Texas, involving one suspect and two victims.

Police found the two victims suffering from gunshot wounds. One victim was pronounced deceased at the scene, while the other was immediately transported to a hospital in the Houston area for treatment.

Louisiana native Leroy Phillip Mitchell turned himself into law enforcement around 7 that same night. Mitchell was arrested on grounds of homicide and charged with murder.

"Charges against Mitchell are still pending and we are currently waiting on the autopsy results of one of the victims," said Chief of Police Larry Johnson.

Local news reports falsely reported the incident as having occurred on the university campus instead of the city of Prairie View.

Due to the news reports, many students voiced their opinions via social media, some stating that an incident that takes place in the city of Prairie View does not define the actions or reputation of students who attend Prairie View A&M University.

Many thought that misstating the location of the shooting shed a bad and false light on the university.

However, students as well as parents were not happy with the untimely release of the information regarding the shooting.

Junior accounting major JaQuita Harris said, "Students should have received information regarding the incident closer to the time that the shooting took place instead of five hours later, since the suspect was still at large."

Some parents described their emotions the moment they received the phone call as, "Angry yet terrified and worried for the safety

of students."

"I sent my child to college to further his education and to get away from the negativity not to worry about his safety and security," a local parent said.

Chief Johnson says that students should "take precautions in difficult situations. Stop, reflect, and allow yourself to calm down. Be more tolerant and understanding. In difficult situations do not be quick to resort to violence as the answer."

Johnson's closing remarks is to "Roll with the flow, everything in life will not go your way. Just walking away is sometimes the best answer in a heated situation. For everything is not worthy of a battle, and nothing justifies taking someone's life."

Students want African American Studies major

Over the past few semesters, many students have asked the same question. Why isn't there a bigger influence of African-American studies in the course catalog?

Some people, such as grad student Maia Young, are surprised that there aren't more courses on African-American history at Prairie View A&M University. She said, "How are you at an HBCU without learning about African-American history? When I was an undergrad at Southern University, there was a huge emphasis on learning your history."

In addition, she explained that there were several required courses on African-American history and literature.

At Prairie View, there are courses that teach students about African-American culture and history in some aspect, but they count toward a minor, not a major in African-American studies. These

courses include Afro-American Art, Afro-American Music, Afro-American Literature, and U.S. History to 1876. While the presence of African-American history as the main focus in each of these courses, students want a bigger focus on their history and culture across the entire course catalog.

Junior Maya Robertson said, "I think there should be more courses on African-American history before slavery, because we're at an HBCU and it makes sense for us to learn about our history while we're here."

Other students, such as Freshman Isaiah Steen, believe that the history of African-Americans is too vast for us to only learn about it while we're in college. "From the time we start school, we should have a knowledge of where we come from...we should know about our history."

Adding to his comment,

Steen also proposed that there should be more African-American private schools in our communities.

He noted that the history and the culture of African-Americans is more extensive than any other history of the world, so there should be more courses on African-American history in all curriculums.

While the need for African-American studies is apparent among the student body, there are also many projects that the university is invested in to improve the campus. These projects include a new stadium for the football team, a new building for the agriculture and business departments, as well as a new fitness center.

Despite the curriculum not providing students a medium of connecting with their past, it is still possible for them to achieve this through individual and communal actions.

The service is especially terrible in the Panther Grill, the managers and workers are rude, slow, and have attitudes," said junior biology major Che'Darria Lacey.

One student made a comment that a Sodexo worker told the customer to make the order themselves when asked if they could have a burger on Texas toast and grilled onions instead of regular onions.

"If you want something done one way, they actually rarely do it, they get an attitude with you," said junior education major Morgan Jackson.

Options at the MSC are slim and the Panther Grill serves as the next option, but hours are

not convenient with the closing time of 9 p.m.

In the fall semester, the Panther Grill stayed open until 11 p.m., which students favored. Also the charging of sauces was a problem for the students but according to Assistant Vice President of Auxiliary Enterprises Tressey Wilson, Chic-fil-a Express is owned through a third party vendor, which allows them to be able to charge for sauces.

When the issue was raised, Wilson was shocked at the alleged behavior of Sodexo employees. "This is unacceptable, very unacceptable, we need to know things like this and it needs to be brought to my attention," said Wilson. "We have zero tolerance, you're here for the students, you have to treat the students fairly with a smile, if you don't want to be a part then we don't need you here."

Wilson has high expectations for the workers and service given to the student body and would like all suggestions regarding the dining service on campus. Suggestions and comment cards can be found on the wall inside of the Panther Grill. She encourages students to fill out as many comment cards as they like and submit them to her by simply sliding them under the door of room 106 or 107, inside of the MSC.

"I need to address these major issues, because what we are looking at is, 'why don't we have a lot of students in the dining facilities,' and I hear this, and it's probably the reason why," Wilson said.

She plans on making changes by addressing the staff first. She highly suggests that students fill out the comment cards so she can directly address each issue to make the dining services friendlier for students.

Students unite to challenge the perception of the PV man

How the PV Man should look, act, and dress is a question that constantly remains on senior mass communication major James Salone's busy thoughts at night. He knew he was not the only one who wondered that. "We thought that it was time that somebody defined it."

The Morehouse College student handbook states that the spirit of brotherhood inspires, nurtures, and sustains successful Morehouse Men.

So, what inspires, nurtures and sustains the PV man?

"It's funny because it all started with us taking a picture in suits, and within a week it went viral. What shocked us was that a lot of people were unaware that men at Prairie View could dress like that," said Salone, a senior mass communication major.

The PV Man is a movement started by Salone and fellow students DeMarcus Pierre, Sidney LaBeauf, Tristan Crayton, Jordan

Ball, Jamaal Rutherford, Marcus Washington.

They started discussing the movement during a trip to the Labor Day Classic game.

Salone says the idea came from Denise Simmons, head of the Office of Student Conduct, who wanted the students to invoke their own ideas of the Prairie View Man.

"While we were on the trip we started talking about what we could do to impact the university, because basically when you turn on the TV or open a paper, you see young men of our color and age group getting shot. We were looking at how big of a role social media played a part in that too," says Salone. "We wanted to change the social stigma of the university." What at first seemed like just a conversation quickly became an agenda they were adamant to push.

Salone says that after they came across the student handbook's moral code they had an idea to help motivate the men on campus into showing their social

responsibility and awareness to what's going on in society.

"We're not trying to be an organization. We're just trying to bring awareness to campus. It's a social movement," Salone explained.

Salone says after he talked to Morehouse alumnus Charles Lewter, dean of the All Faiths Chapel, he got more clarity on what makes someone a man of their university's bearing.

"When we talked to Dean Lewter we asked him 'Why when you graduated from Morehouse you considered yourself a Morehouse Man.' It turns out that Morehouse's has a time at the start of the fall semester where all its incoming freshmen dress up for a whole week and they have this mind set that they need to be men, and they are surrounded by male mentors. Why don't we have that on our campus," says Salone.

Pierre believes student unity will nurture a successful PV man.

"We want to show that being a part of this movement does not mean you want to be a part of any of the other many organizations on campus. It's just to get the student body back together. We're trying to get it back to when students influenced the campus," Pierre said. "Now everyone is influenced by competing on social media."

Similar to Morehouse dressing up also seems to play a huge part in the recipe.

"We want to get young men to realize they should always have on decent attire because you may not know who you may meet or what opportunities you may come across," said Rutherford. "You don't have to be dressed in a three piece suit to be the PV Man but a lot of opportunities are missed because someone decided to wear basketball shorts."

"This movement is not just to get buzz, it's to uplift the whole campus," says Pierre. "People should stop being so close

minded, just because you dress up doesn't mean you want to be a Greek."

Salone says that the movement will continue to inspire male freshmen and uplift the university as a whole, but without a large amount of positive leadership the negative publicity will remain.

"The circle of leadership on campus is really small, basically it's everyone that stays on the second floor. If you take that leadership and compare that to the amount of party promoters and people who don't go to PV but are always in the MSC they outnumber us," says Salone.

He adds that the movement will not only focus on the men of the university but will also be a platform to help nurture, inspire, and sustain, the university's mission.

"I guess to us the idea is changing lives," says Salone.

Paul Quinn announces work college, free textbook plans

Paul Quinn College yesterday announced plans to become the nation's first historically black work college, a move that will potentially save its students more than \$12,000 in tuition costs annually, and will reduce potential student loan debt

to about \$2,300 per academic year.

In front of more than 300 students and faculty members, Paul Quinn President Michael Sorrell introduced the new program, which will require students to work on campus in a variety of jobs for their first two years, and will pair students with corporate and private companies for tuition credit for their final two years.

"You're going to have work experiences that directly translate to you getting full-time employment when you graduate," Sorrell told the audience.

The college also debuted plans to allow the use of open source textbooks for all students, which school officials say will reduce out-of-pocket expenses even further for a campus where

84 percent of the student body qualifies for federal Pell Grant funding.

Dallas Mavericks Owner Mark Cuban is working with the school to develop the program, along with a new on-campus course in entrepreneurship. In a release, Cuban called the initiative a model for rethinking higher education costs.

"I'm excited to be working with PQC and President Sorrell to help remake the economics of the university experience. Our partnership will also include creating a unique approach to teaching entrepreneurship, with any and all materials available under an open source license for other institutions to use."

Dentist charged in death of patient getting 20 teeth pulled

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP) -- A dentist has been charged in the death of a patient who became unresponsive while having 20 teeth pulled and several implants installed.

Rashmi Patel turned himself in Tuesday at the Enfield Police Department and was charged with a misdemeanor count of criminally negligent homicide and a felony count of tampering with evidence, police said. Patel has offices in Enfield and Torrington.

The charges came a year after Patel's patient Judith Gan died at a hospital on Feb. 17, 2014. State dental regulators concluded that Patel failed to adequately respond when Gan's oxygen levels dropped dangerously low as she was consciously sedated in the middle of the tooth extraction and implant procedures in his Enfield office that day.

Patel, who posted \$25,000 bail, has denied any wrongdoing in his treatment of Gan.

"Dr. Patel disputes the charges and urges that the charges be dropped," his attorney Paul Knag said in a statement Wednesday.

Gan's death and other incidents prompted the State Dental Commission in December to suspend Patel's license pending a months-long review of his practice and permanently ban him from performing conscious sedation.

But, Krag said, the commission did not revoke Patel's license.

"In the Dental Commission proceeding, multiple expert witnesses testified that Dr. Patel followed the standard of care," Krag said. "The state's seeking of criminal charges is contrary to this evidence and

inconsistent with the decision of the Commission not to revoke his license."

The commission said in a report that Patel "ignored" signs that Gan, of Ellington, was in distress, including the drop in her oxygen saturation, changes in the color of her face and hands and wheezing and gurgling sounds. The commission said Patel, who lives in Suffield, also ignored warnings from his dental assistants that Gan was in danger and continued with the procedures.

When one of Patel's assistants yelled that Gan was "flat lining," Patel tried to revive Gan while the assistant called 911, according to the Dental Commission's report. Gan, 64, was rushed to a hospital, where she was pronounced dead.

The commission also found that Patel should not have attempted to perform so many procedures on Gan in one office visit given that her medical history included a heart attack six months before the visit, two strokes within the last two years and medication that could have affected her response to the sedation.

Patel also violated care standards in December 2013 when another patient under conscious sedation to have teeth extracted inhaled a piece of gauze called a throat pack, which was designed to protect him from swallowing foreign objects, the commission found. The patient began flailing, his blood pressure spiked and he was rushed to a hospital but recovered.

A lawyer for Gan's husband has said a lawsuit against Patel is planned.

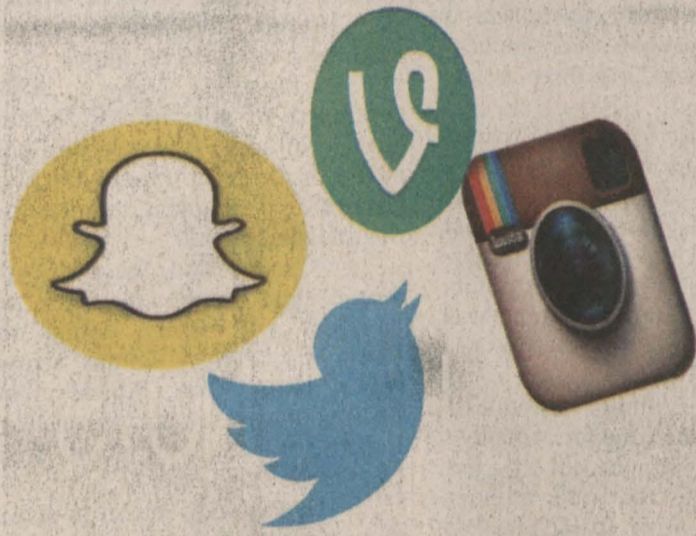

PV demolishes Grambling 95-44

GRAMBLING, La. -- Five Prairie View A&M players scored in double figures Monday as the Panthers cruised to a 95-44 win at Grambling State.

Tre Hagood scored 15 points and handed out four assists, while Reggis Onwukamuche posted a double-double with 10 points and 12 rebounds to lead the Panthers (9-16) to their third straight win, and seventh triumph in the last nine games.

Jayrn Johnson came off the PVAMU bench to score 14 points on 6-of-11 shooting. Zach Hamilton entered the game as a reserve and scored 12 points on 5-of-8 shooting.

Not to be forgotten, Montrael Scott, Prairie View A&M's leading scorer this season, scored 11 points and grabbed six rebounds. Scott also handed out three assists in the game.

Prairie View A&M turned in an all-around dominating performance Monday, as the Panthers' 95 points was the most they have scored in a game this season. In addition, the 44 points scored by Grambling State was the fewest scored by a PVAMU opponent this season.

The Panthers wasted little time setting the tone for Monday's game as they jumped out to a six-point lead less than five minutes into the game. John Brisco knocked down a 3-pointer with 15:21 remaining in the first half to give the Panthers an 8-2 advantage.

Prairie View A&M continued to pour it on as the first half progressed. The Panthers went on a 15-3 run following Brisco's trey to take a 24-9 lead with 8:59 left to play in the opening period.

The visitors took their first 20-point lead with 5:50 remaining before halftime at 31-11. The Panthers took a 43-19 lead into halftime.

The Panthers shot 49 percent (17 of 35) from the floor in the first half, while holding the Tigers to 23 percent shooting (6 of 26). The Panthers were equally efficient from the 3-point arc, making four out of their eight long-range shots in the first half.

Onwukamuche was part of Grambling's offensive problems in the first half, as he blocked three shots during the game's first 20 minutes and four in the game.

Prairie View A&M continued to put the ball in the basket with ease in the second half as the Panthers hit 57 percent (21 of 37) of their field-goal attempts after the midgame break.

Brisco and Jacoby Green scored eight points apiece for the Panthers, with Green doling out four assists. Avery Lomax scored seven points for Prairie View A&M, followed by six points from Karim York and four points from Charleston Dobbs.

The Panthers return to action at home Saturday when they host Mississippi Valley State. Tipoff is at 5 p.m.

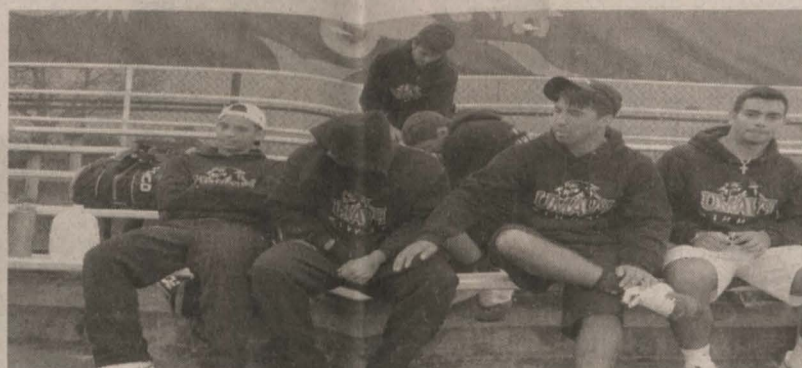

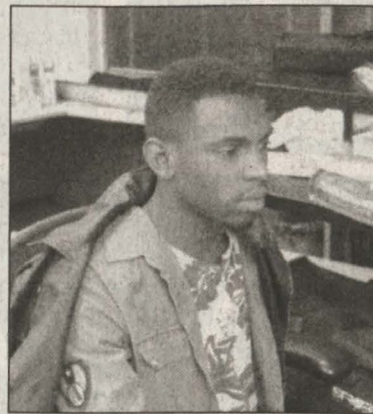

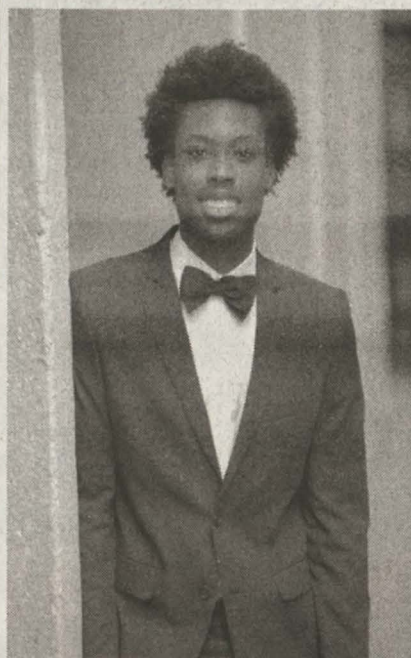

Over the course of our term President LaBeauf and myself have committed ourselves to a number of tasks. Some of these tasks are to work on issues that not only effect you directly but issues that will help us as an organization best serve you. Upon my ascension to the office of Executive Vice President (EVP), I took the time to map out key issues that I felt would need to be addressed. On this list of items was the election code. This governing document is used to inform and govern the elections process used to select not only the executive and judicial members of our SGA, but also our class royals. As a senator under both administrations of my predecessor Jarrick Brown, the elections committee identified the need to make changes to the Election Code. At the time we made small changes that were extremely impactful in making the elections process smoother. It was not until I had the privilege of monitoring our elections process from an alternate point of view that I saw the real need to expand our current Election Code. With the help of key representatives within our organization we drafted a brand new Election Code. In the new code we decided to keep the structure of our current elections process with some key changes. The changes are as follows:

All elections will be moved

to the Spring semester with the exception of our freshman student leadership.

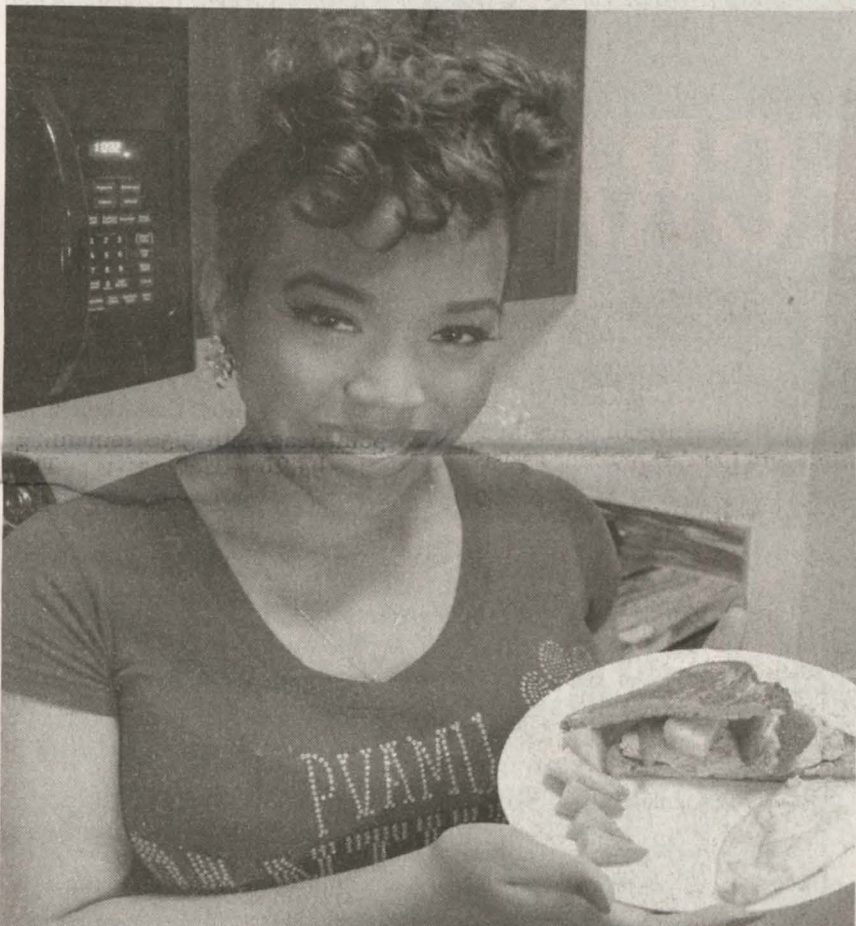
- Students will only vote for the SGA Senator(s) of their college
- Class Royals will be required to conduct 15hrs of committee service and will be assigned by SGA Leadership to attend a mandatory program/event.

What do these changes mean? These changes will mean that every student on our campus who wants to be an elected student leader will go through the elections process in the spring for the term beginning in the following fall. The idea behind this process is to elect officials early so that they can have the summer to go through formal training for the elected position if needed. This will better prepare our students so that they can be of quality representation for us all. The changes regarding the limitation on voting for legislative members was mimicked after the districting process used in our state elections. This basically means that I can only vote for the students that will be representing me directly. Example: I am a student under the College of Agriculture and Human Science so I would only vote for a student running for a position in my college. In turn this will place more responsibility and accountability onto the candidates. Lastly, in moving the Class Royal elections to the spring we also decided to change the requirements of the crown. In the past not much was required of these student leaders however, we would like to see them blossom into effective student leaders on our campus. So we decided to require community service hours along with the addition of their attendance at a mandatory university event as assigned by SGA. This event could be a recruitment luncheon, alumni gala, hosting opportunities, etc.

We as an SGA plan to enact this election code so that we can use it in our elections process this spring. 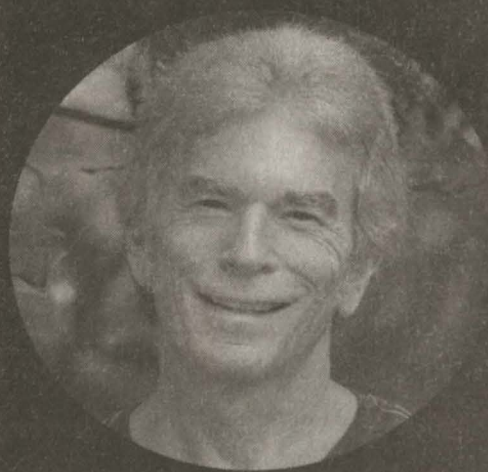
