PV Band To Play At Oiler Game





Many of this country's greatest citizens got its start in the PVIL (Prairie View Interscholastic League). For a long time Prairie View was the site of the Texas State Championship in basketball, track, and tennis. Some of sports greatest Friday night heroes made thin marks on "The Hill."

mid 50's, sports experts called Prairie View a "Black Notre Dame" in football. During those heroic 1950's, the Panthers won four consecutive outright Southwestern Athletic is a feat no Black College can boast. Two National Championships were claimed by the powerful Billy Nicks' led Charlie "choo-choo" Brackins Panthers.

Speaking of Brackins, pro scouts called Brackins "the greatest quarterback to ever Manning. put on a college football uniform." Brackins was indispensable. He holds 28 PV individual statistical records. "I have yet to see a quarterback that came close to Brackins," stated former Panther assistant coach

The Panthers boast one of the greatest runners in the invincible John Payton. There boast such a feat. were other classful runners like Archie Seals, Calvin Scott, Clem Daniels, Roy Don Dillion, Johnny Price, Tex Clark, and many more.

The late John "Bo" Farrington and Charles Wright, were in a class by themselves as ends. Wright was a three time All American and is the only Panther to make All American in three sports-football, basketball, track. He was All SWAC in four sports-football, basketball, track, and baseball.

Later, there came Otis Taylor, one of the most talented players to ever play at PV. Ken Houston, made PV's defensive one of the most feared in

In track, the Panthers have always been a powerhouse dating back to the late 20's when the late Sam Taylor, was the coach. But it was players of the late 50's, the 60's and 70's, that have drawn the most ecognition. The 50's produced David "Lightening" Fant, Albert Nunn, John Farrington, and Elmer Wooley. The 70's had Fred Newhouse, the world indoor record holder in the 440 yard dash. Also, there was Felix Johnson, Alvin Dotson, Jessie

Ball, etc. In golf, the Panthers were the first Black College to gain National recognition. Tommy Johnson, Tommy Williams, and Billy Massey were the pioneers in the late 50's.

Recently, the Panthers gained National fame with Leonard Jones, Curtis Carter, Paul Reed, Robert Jackson, Michael Sapenter, and Marvin Wilson. When one looks at the

Panthers overall athletic record, he can find no other college to compare with it.

Armstrong Called V's Sixth Man

Panther head basketball Coach Elwood Plummer calls his 6-4 junior forward Robert "Bones" Armstrong, "The best sixth man in college."

For Robert Armstrong, coming off the bench and burning the nets for the high scoring Prairie View Panthers has become a way of life. It doesn't matter to him if he comes off the bench or start. "It's alright with me either way," stated Armstrong who came off the bench in several games last year to score 20 or more points.

Even though he has come off the bench with a hot hand Armstrong isn't content that he perfoms better in that role. "I don't know if I perform better coming off the bench or starting," he said. "I believe I can do as well starting.'

It's evident that in either role Armstrong will perform. In an exhibition against Bergstrom Air Force Base he scored 23 points as a starter. He pumped in 22 coming off the bench against Huston Tillotson in the Panthers season opening 111-72 win. In this first two games he was averaging 21.0 points and 15 rebounds a game.

Armstrong grew up in Dallas' often called "tough West Side," but he never encountered any problems.

"Growing up in West Dallas was hard," he said. "I never got into any trouble, because I was always playing basketball," he continued.

He has been bouncing that big round ball a long time. "I started playing basketball when I was in the 4th grade at C. F. Carr Elementary School," he said. "I played at Thomas Edison Junior High," he stated.

But it was a L. G. Pinkston high school, where college scouts began to take notice. He averaged 24 points and 14 rebounds as a junior and 26 points and 14 rebounds a game as a senior. He scored 31 points and had 19 rebounds against Kimball. Those kind of credentials drew some 60 scouts to his home. He got invitations to attend Southern California, Indiana, Nebraska, Iowa State, as well as Prairie View.

At Prairie View Armstrong has become one of the main men in Coach Elwood Plummer's high octane offense that led the nation with 107.0 game average last season. They scored 100 or more in 19 of 26 games. In their first two games this season the Panthers scored 111-72 over Huston Tillotson and beat Bishop 114-90.

To Armstrong scoring a 100 is not a big concern as it was in the beginning. "Since our record has been a 100 points it's a McAdory led all scorers with 23 points against Bishop while Panthers for the 22nd time in
