Ronald Thompson, Greg Austin, Richard Bennett, and David Bohannon, were named to the NAIA All District team. Austin and Thompson, were also named to the NAIA All Texas team.

Thompson, a 6-2, 195 Junior linebacker is from Houston, Texas. He led the team with 140 tackles. Austin, 6-2, 258 pound Junior offensive guard, is from Brazoria. Bennett, the first freshman from PVU to make the elite team, is a 6-2, 225 pound defensive tackle from Montecello, Fla. He had 99 tackles and 5 quarterback sacks. In his first 7 games he averaged 26.2 points a game.
