Prairie View joined the other 99 Texas colleges as Texas served as host for the first time to the American Association of Collegiate Registrars and Admissions Officers, April 16-19, at the Rice Hotel, Houston, Texas. More than 300 delegates from 38 states, Mexico, and Canada were represented at this the 37th Annual Conven-

Dr. and Mrs. E. L. Sasser represented Tennessee A & I College of Nashville, Tenn. Dr. Sasser was formerly head of the English Department and director of the Division of Arts and Sciences at Prairie View.

Appearing before the convention as speakers were Dr. Arthur S. Adams, president of the American Council on Education; Dr. Elwood C. Kastner, registrar, New York University and president of the Association; Dr. R. L. Sutherland of the Hogg Foundation, University of Texas; Mr. Delbert Downing, Midland, Texas, and Dr. Charles W. McLane, director American Council on Education's Commission on Accreditation in Service Experience.


It is hoped that the present members of the drill team will receive something which will distinguish them as being a part of the original special drill team of the Prairie View R.O.T.C.

Messrs Elbert Hardeman and M. B. Tolson are the sponsors of the club.

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

The Panther baseball squad looked good as they split a twogame series with Sam Houston, winning the opener 11-6 and dropping the second 6-4. Arthur Brown and McDay went the routes in both games.

Prairie View lost a single game to Texas College 12-3. McDay was the losing pitcher.

The Prairie View thin clads edged out another victory on the cinders as they scored 61 points, with strong Tillotson College scoring 60 points.

The Panthers scored heavy in the field events, with Deo and Grace placing 1-2 in the shot and discus. Smith and Washington placed 2-1 in the broad jump. Price and Floyd placed 1-2 in the pole vault. Washington placed 2nd in the high jump and Davis placed 3rd in the javelin throw.

Prairie View lost the 440 and mile relay in photo finishes to Tillotson.

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
