# stabbed Monday

Cledell Brown was rushed to the Memorial Hermann Hospital in Houston by medical helicopter Monday after being stabbed outside the William "Billy" J. Nicks Building following a men's basketball game, the university's public relations office said.

During a brawl outside of the building, Brown suffered stab wounds in his arm, chest and shoul-

der, a close friend reported.

Sheleah Hughes, director of public relations, said Tuesday that Brown was in stable condition.

According to witnesses, Brown was involved in a fist-fight earlier that Monday.

"There's too much behind the story to tell," said a close friend of the victim. Hughes said that a first-year student

confirmed his involvement in the incident Tuesday. Lieutenant David Webb of the De-

partment of Public Safety said, "Someone is in custody and facts are still coming in."

Hughes said, "As a university, our primary responsibility concerns the safety and well being of our students. We will continue to monitor the health of the hospitalized stu-

# Senior student PVAMU introduces ambassadors Student leaders are first of their kind

Seeking new student leaders and additional assistance, the Office of Special Programs and Cultural Series has recently created a new student organization called Prairie View

Program Coordinator II Isis McCraw said, "A PV Ambassador is an upper classman who has certain qualities and characteristics that will help enhance our program. They are students who have good attitudes, look very approachable, and dress appropriately. If someone were to peek inside of a classroom sting, they would likely be the students who sit in the front row."

A small group consisting of only 20 students, the PV Ambassadors are a special group of students selected by McCraw, who are first educated on the history and knowledge of the university, and assist with the preparation of special events and the hospitable treatment of special guests.

Qualifications to be a PV Ambassador include a minimum of 30 credit hours and a minimum grade point average of 3.0. These students' tasks include planning and working "behind the scenes" in special events that are held campus-wide.

According to McCraw, "I want them to know that things don't just happen, you don't just show up at a program and the speaker is there. There's a planning process behind everything, and I want them to be involved with getting things together."

Occasionally, these students also attend special sessions called retreats.

During these retreats, the students are allowed the time to be educated on new things at the university and reflect on some of the events that they've assisted in putting to-

During their first retreat of the school year, the students had the opportunity to have a roundtable discussion with Mayor Frank Jackson about the history of the university.

Jackson shared his infinite knowledge about the history of Prairie View with the PV Ambassadors during this session.

Jackson said, "When I first arrived at Prairie View, I wanted to be an engineer, but at the time, I was totally unaware of what an engineer was. Prairie View changed that, and ultimately changed my life. I just wanted to pass the knowledge on what I've gained down to this generation of students."

# Frazier, Black, Spears given key to city SWAC celebration continues into new ye

In celebration of the school's first football championship since 1964, the student body, band, cheerleaders, and administrators gathered to recognize Coach Henry Frazier

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III and the 2009 SWAC Champions Prairie View A&M University football team for their achievements.

The event first began with a parade, in which the band, cheerleaders, and football team marched and rode down L.W. Minor Street to the Blackshear Stadium, where they were awaited by faithful members of the Panther nation. Upon arrival to the stadium, the players and coaches were individually introduced, including junior quarterback K.J. Black, who received 2009 SWAC Offensive Player of the Year. Black, who gained his starting position midway through the season, also managed to lead the NCAA's FCS division in passing efficiency.

"It's an honor to win SWAC Offensive Player of the Year, but I didn't do it alone," said Black. "I feel that without my teammates, none of these achievements would've been possible." Agreeing with Black, redshirt freshman Spencer Nelson, a member of Black's receiving core added, "Being on a championship team means a lot, because we all now have championship attitudes that will carry over into the off-season."

Redshirt junior and defensive end Quinton Spears was also honored at the 2009 SWAC Championship receiving the Defensive Player of the Year.

Aside from being awarded the championship trophy, the entire football team received keys to the city of Prairie View from Mayor Frank Jackson. President George C. Wright was also on hand to celebrate the end of the 45-year football championship drought.

Wright explained, "Athletics are a window into the university. For many prospective students, watching us on television or reading about us in a news article plays a significant role in their decision to attend the university. Upon arrival, they are exposed to the many outstanding academic programs that we have to offer, but sports often serve as the door to the university. Our recent achievements on the football field will add to that success."

Frazier, who is 25-5 in the past three seasons as head coach, inherited the program in 2004. At the time, Frazier was entering what many considered the "graveyard of college football coaches," seeing how the school had a combined record of 9-55 since 1998, after first experiencing seven straight winless seasons from 1991-1997, a streak which has yet to be surpassed by any other program in the NCAA.

During Frazier's first three years at Prairie View he and his staff managed to maintain an 11-21 record, and it seemed as if the program was headed in a new direction. After the team's 7-3 record in 2007, Frazier had delivered the first winning season at PVAMU since 1988. Now, after leading the Panthers to a championship season, Frazier finds himself on a pedestal among other college coaches, receiving honorary Coach of the Year Awards from Pigskins Club of Washington D.C., SWAC, College Sporting News, American Football Coaches Association (Region III), Boxtorow.com/BASN, the ESPN HBCU Notebook and the Black College Sports

Frazier said, "The biggest part of our program is consistency. My coaching staff and I have been together for five years now, and we're able to consistently bring new talent in

and red-shirt our younger guys, so that they can have time to focus on school and develop their talent. We make sure our guys are prepared before we start counting on them."

After winning the SWAC Championship it seems as if the Prairie View A&M University football program is no longer the laughing stock of collegiate athletics. Limiting opponents' third down conversion to only 40 percent, the team's defense, led by Spears played a significant role in this year's success.

Assistant Linebacker's Coach John Pearce said, "Our defensive line, and secondary were very experienced this year. However, aside from senior Renoldo Revuelta, our line backing core had limited experience. We have to improve on our line backing core, and our defense as a whole, so that we can compete for another championship next season."



# PVAMU grieves loss of two students Burnell and Denton lost during holiday break

PVAMU has lost two more students, Freshman business management major George Denton, Jr. died Saturday, Jan. 9, and 21-year-old architecture major David Allen Webster Burnell died early Sunday, Jan. 16, from injuries related to a one car accident in Killeen, Texas.

A native of New Orleans, students and University staff who knew him report that Denton was a spirited student who exhibited school pride and commitment to his studies.

"The entire PVAMU family is saddened to hear the news of

such an untimely death. We extend our condolences to his family and friends during their time of bereavement," said Prairie View A&M President George C. Wright.

Burnell's wake was held on Friday, Jan. 22 from 7 to 8 p.m. at St. James United Methodist Church in Waco. His funeral service was held Saturday, Jan. 23 at 3 p.m. at the Christian House of Prayer in Copperas Cove, Texas.

"We are saddened by the loss of David Burnell," said Prairie View A&M President George C. Wright. "We mourn the passing of this young man, and on behalf of the University community, we extend our heartfelt sympathies to his family and friends."

"The support and effort from the student body and administration has facilitated us to increase our tonnage which has ultimately boosted the number of recycling bins placed on the main campus."

The extension of "Go Green" will kick off in a few weeks. The "Go Green" project, is subsequently the same structure as is on the main campus.

The Abitibibowater Company will continue to be the University's main recycling supplier and about eight of the new totters will be placed in generalized locations around the downtown Houston campus.

Eventually, Powell wants to expand the "Go Green" program and have recycling bins for glass, batteries and cans, but you have to find companies that will come out to Prairie View.

Powell said, "It's the little things that you can do to help that the students really don't realize they are doing already."



# Advice for Productive Students

### WHAT EMPLOYERS LOOK FOR IN AN INTERVIEW

Two basic things that will ensure every interview is a successful interview:

Remember that always that it is the company that invited you to the interview; it is they who initiated the event. You would not be there if they were not already inclined to like you. Compose yourself accordingly; try to see yourself as a welcome, first-time guest.

While the ultimate purpose of an interview is to get an offer for the position, the more immediate objective is for the company to get to know you better, and for you to get to know it better. Everything you do with regard to an interview should have this as the dual objective. Achieve this, and you will have had a successful interview. The basis of the interview is two parties seeking a mutual solution to each other's needs. Never forget this.

Generally, the interviewer is interested in determining the following things:

1. The reason for your interest in the job.

2. Your qualifications.

3. A feeling for your personality - particularly how you act and think in everyday situations. Key points:

RESEARCH THE ORGA-NIZATION/WEBSITE: Find out as much as you can about the company (products, services, clients, company growth, prospects of growth in the future). This kind of preparation will help you answer some specific questions and may suggest some questions you would like to ask. It also shows your interest in the company and this will influence the employer's interest in you. Being able to converse intelligently about the company will create a very favorable impression.

PREPARE: Make a list of your strengths and weaknesses, your skills and talents, your ambitions, your experiences, and your values. It is important to have a

clear idea of who you are, what you want, and where you are going. You need to have confidence in yourself (but NEVER be over confident). Frequently, employers will ask one of the following open-ended questions: "Tell me about yourself?" "Why should we hire you?" or "What can you do for us?" Be prepared.

BE ON TIME. Fifteen minutes early is a good rule. This will allow you to present yourself to the receptionist in a relaxed and composed manner.

ALWAYS BRING A RE-SUME, but do not offer it unless asked. (The company should already have a copy of your resume). Do not provide anything that you need

APPEARANCE: Present yourself professionally and conservatively. Remember, the company is interested in finding someone who is comfortable with their culture, not someone who is interested in making a fashion statement. Avoid the use of cologne/perfume as it will not help and may hurt. Your appearance is an expression of your inner state of mind. Being poorly dressed shows lack of good taste and an apathetic attitude.

In other words, "dress for success." You get only one chance to make a first impression. Interviewers will size you up within 30 seconds of laying their eyes on you. The first impression is a lasting one.

GREETING: Be pleasant and engaging. Maintain a lot of energy, enthusiasm, and excitement. Good eye contact, a strong handshake, and a confident smile will get everything off to a good start. Remember, the interviewer is looking for someone to hire; they like your resume or you wouldn't be there. Greet the interviewer(s) by their last name(s) in a friendly, but in a businesslike manner. Don't use the interviewer's first name unless specifically asked to do so.

COMPOSURE: Remain standing until you are offered a seat. Once seated, sit erectly; do not slouch. Place your arms and hands on the armrests of the chair. Be certain that your body language is natural and complementary to the discussion.

Leaning back could give the impression of a lax attitude. A defensive person will be closed off (i.e. folded arms across the chest). Maintain eve contact throughout the interview. It is natural to be nervous in anticipation of an interview. Remember though, it is a meeting of those with a mutual interest. Interviewers are sometimes stern without intending to be. You are there at their invitation.

NOTES: Bring a pen and paper, but avoid taking notes during your interview. Immediately following the interview, jot down key points that you want to remember.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS: Indicate the impact you have had while working for your current and previous employer(s). This would include any major accomplishments and organizational changes that you have created/implemented. This is a good time to share ideas about what you can do for the interviewer's company. Have a plan before the interview.

PROBLEM SOLVING AND THINKING SKILLS: Demonstrate that you have the ability to solve job-related problems and that you anticipate what needs to be done. (Elaborate).

LEADERSHIP: Let the interviewer know that you have the ability to persuade and motivate others. Team leadership is a component of both management and personality. Share management ability and style, and organizational skills.

YOUR QUESTIONS: Be prepared to ask several questions at the end of the interview, but avoid questions about compensation or benefits. If asked about your current salary, advise what it is, but indicate

that you don't want to comment on salary expectations until you know more about the opportunity and the company. Just like you wouldn't offer a price for a car without knowing all about the options that are included on it, you wouldn't want to commit too early on your "price." You might say: "Compensation is extremely important to me, and I will consider your best offer, but frankly what is most important at this point is what I can offer your company and what the future will hold for both of us in a long-term relationship."

INTEREST: If, at the conclusion of the interview, you are still interested in the position, be certain that the interviewer knows this. Indicate that you want to pursue the opportunity and ask what the next step will be.

STAY POSITIVE: Even if, during the interview, your instincts tell you that the position isn't right for you, keep that to yourself for now. Once home, you may change your mind. If, after thinking about it further, you still feel the position is not a good fit for you, make sure you take yourself out of consideration professionally. If appropriate, let the company know that you would like to keep the door open for future opportunities.

REFERENCES: Have available a list of references that you can present if requested. This list should include names and phone numbers of former supervisors at previous companies who are able and willing to discuss in detail your work performance, usually for positions held in the last five years. Be sure that you have checked your references thoroughly so that you can be assured that they will provide positive feedback to the inquirer.

### Top 10 tips for getting into graduate school

1. Go to graduate school for your reasons - not for other people's. Graduate study represents an enormous investment of time and

2. Be realistic about the benefits of graduate study. Don't fall into thinking that a graduate degree is a magic bullet that will guarantee you career advancement or personal fulfillment. Some fields require an advanced degree for advancement; some don't.

3. Research your program options carefully. There's a bewildering array of degrees and programs available in many fields. Make sure you understand the difference between one program and another.

4. Think about taking graduate level classes on a non-degree basis. Many colleges and universities allow people to take a limited number of courses without having to apply for or enroll in a degree program. Doing so can give you an idea of what to expect from graduate

5. Take the time to prepare for the Graduate Record Examination. There are many good test preparation books available. Use them! A good GRE score alone won't get you into grad school, but it will bolster any application. Besides, if you're required to submit test scores, you may as well make sure you submit good ones.

6. Work out the story of your life - and how you will tell it to the admissions committee. You're not going to graduate school just by chance. Something led you to this decision - life experience, intellectual curiosity, career ambitions. Your story makes you unique. It differentiates you from the pool of other applicants the admissions committee considers.

7. Learn more about the school you want to get into. Find out what is going on at your chosen school. Has a faculty member recently won an award, or has a research project made the news? That is the kind of information that you can use to help explain why you think this school or program is the right one for you (and why you are the right student for it).

8. Get an early start on your personal statement. Your personal statement may be the most important part of your application. It tells the admissions committee who you are, and why they should want you at their school. Don't leave it until the last minute - you'll want time to review and revise. Don't follow a canned outline, or ask someone else to write your statement for you. Admissions committees can spot generic and ghostwritten material a mile off, and they don't like it.

9. Work on getting your letters of reference. This can be one of the more intimidating aspects of graduate school admissions, especially for applicants who have been out of college for a while. Think about what kind of information will help your application - would it help to have some assurance that you're intellectually capable of graduate level study, or that you can handle a heavy workload? Who can provide a credible letter that provides that information? Don't be overly shy about asking people to write letters for you.

10. Relax! Once you have your application and supporting materials submitted (and know they've been received), there's nothing more you can do. Take a break from your labors. With attention to the above tips - and some luck - you should soon be in the position of having to choose among acceptances. 



Senior guard Candice Thomas blows the roof off the William "Billy" Nicks Building with an ecstatic behind the back move saving the ball from going out of bounds line and rolling to the rim with a crowed pleasing lay-up.

The Lady Panthers lead by Head Coach Cynthia Cooper-Dyke came into the match-up against Arkansas Pine-Bluff at (8-6, 5-0 SWAC). The Lady Golden Lions were a mediocre (3-13, 2-3 SWAC) lead by senior forward Shavondra Holmes and junior guard Laquisha Slaton who are the keys to their offense with Holmes averaging 13.3 per game and Slaton leading the team in assist. Although Slaton leading the Lady Golden Lions in assist

she wasn't looking to pass the ball Saturday night scoring a game high of 31 points.

At half-time Prairie View A&M was leading Pine Bluff 43-42, with a fast start. At the 15:01 mark the Lady Panthers were up 60-50. The Lady Panthers maintained a 10point lead for much of the 2nd half, but the Lady Golden Lions would not back down and allow Prairie View to get an unmanageable lead.

When asked about the team's feeling about their performance mid-way through the season Thomas said, "We feel that we are playing Ok. Every team is bringing their best game against us and we realize that we just have to keep playing together and bring the intensity and play hard every game."

The Lady Panthers had

four different players in double-digits scoring lead by Candice Thomas with 26 and Dominique Smith with 15. The combination of the Lady Panthers' offensive play and pressure defense lead to a 87-80 victory.

Coming off a physical win over APBU the Lady Panthers rolled against Mississippi Valley with a victory of 83-62. Latara Darrett scored a career-high 29 points and grabbed seven rebounds as the Lady Panthers improved to (10-6, 7-0 SWAC), completing the two-game home stand and extending their consecutive conference win streak to 23 games in the Southwestern Athletic Conference. The Mississippi Valley State Devilettes at (4-14, 1-6 SWAC) were no match for the streaking Panthers.

The Lady Panthers started the game fast with a 7-0 run but the Lady Devilettes would not back down. Mississippi Valley State would make it a 10-8 game, and throughout the first half would not let up as they cut a ten point Lady Panther lead down to a six bringing the halftime score to 33-27.

The second half for Prairie View A&M was a different story as the Lady Panthers would put the car in drive, and were up 46-33 at the 16:13 mark. The scoring punch of Darrett, Werema, Dominique Smith and Courtney Larsen was too much for the Devilettes to handle.

The Lady Panthers will head to Alabama for a two-game road trip to take on Alabama A&M on Jan. 30 and Alabama State on Feb. 1.

#### **Bowling team tied for** SWAC divisional lead

BATON ROUGE, La. - The Prairie View A&M bowling team closed out its most important event to date on a positive note as they finished the 2010 SWAC West Bowling Round-ups tied for the divisional

Held at Don Carter Lanes in Baton Rouge, La., the Lady Panthers opened the round-up on Friday with easy wins over Mississippi Vallev State and Alabama State before battling with two-time defending SWAC Champion Southern University. The Lady Panthers rose to the occasion and defeated Southern on its own turf and followed it up with another win against Jackson State.

After an impressive 4-0 start, the Lady Panthers headed into Friday's finale against Grambling State a heavy favorite as they were undefeated against the Lady Tigers in earlier games this season. However, Prairie View picked the wrong time to bowl its worst game of the season as Grambling State pulled off the upset and denied the Lady Panthers a shot at first place after the first day of action.

"I think we got complacent before the game started as we've beaten them routinely this year,' said head coach Glenn White on Friday. "We weren't focused and left Grambling in the game too long and they got on a roll. We came back in the 10th frame but it was too little too late."

The team responded and finished with a 4-0 mark on Sunday which created a two-way tie atop the SWAC West standings with South-

"We had to win if we wanted to reach our goal of finishing at the top this weekend," said White. "I was proud of how my team performed on Sunday as we accomplished our goal due to being tied for first in the SWAC West."

Along with being tied for the SWAC Western Division lead, the Lady Panthers finished the tournament ranked second overall in total pins behind Alabama A&M. Freshman Cynthia Veney led the team with an average of 191.4 and had three big games with scores of 244, 243 and 232. Sophomore Lejewlia Lewis followed with a 178.5 average that included scores of 232 and 217.

The Lady Panthers are in great position to qualify for the SWAC Tournament for only the second time in school history.

The Panthers started the home stand with a disappointing loss Saturday night when they fell to Arkansas-Pine Bluff 62-54.

The Golden Lions were led by Tavaris Washington as he scored 13 points. Washington was 6 of 7 from the field and set the tone early in the game with a dunk to put the Golden Lions (5-12, 5-1) up 2-0 and start a 7-0 run. Prairie View A&M did not score their first field goal until the 14:43 mark in the first half.

The Panthers (9-8, 4-2) would tie the game at 28-28 at the half. With the score 39-36 the Golden Lions would go on a 13-4 run and go ahead 52-40 with 7:41 left to play. The Golden Loins would not let their foot off the gas and their lead was not threatened for the rest of the game. Hugee led the Panthers

with a game-high 20 points and 11 rebounds and Meadows added 11 points and six rebounds.

The Panthers grabbed 37 rebounds including 14 offensive boards, to the Golden Lions' 28 and just four offensive boards. The Panthers downfall was from 3-point range where they only managed to shoot 2 of 13 (15.4 percent).

It took overtime to take down the visiting Delta Devils, but Prairie View and the play of Hugee overcame the comeback by Mississippi Valley State. Hugee scored eight of his game-high 25 points in the overtime session, the Panthers went on to grab the emotional victory 69-63.

The Panthers had a promising start with a 10-3 lead in the first four minutes of the game. Duwan Kornegay had a huge impact from the wing position, Kornegay scored 11 points in the first half alone

bringing a spark to the team and the 4,275 fans watching in the William Nicks Building Monday night.

With everyone contributing guard Griffin came off the bench and seemed to take control of the offense as the Panthers went on a 6-0 run bringing the score to 48-38 at the 8:51 mark.

In the final 2:15 of the game MVSU went on a 8-0 run to tie the

In overtime it was all Prairie View as they knew they wanted to get to the big man, "Hugee." Only up by two with 1:31 remaining the Panthers held off MVSU as they committed consecutive turnovers. Griffin would knock down two clutch free throws in the final 27 seconds to seal the win.

Prairie View will roll into Alabama to face off against Alabama A&M on Jan. 30 and Alabama State on Feb. 1.




Overall, the movie is amazing. I will definitely be heading to see it again in IMAX.






